

## DEPARTMENT 200: SMALL ANIMALS

---

(NOVELTY GOATS, POULTRY, RABBITS, CAVIES, DOGS, CATS, HEDGEHOGS)

Refer to 4-H/ FFA General Rules and Regulations.

1. Enter goats, self-determined, poultry, rabbits and cavies Thursday, 12PM to 6PM of fair week.
2. **Entry forms and exhibition tags must show manner in which each entry is to be shown as to breed, variety, call and lot.**
3. Each rabbit exhibitor is allowed a total of five (5) entries. Indicate breed on entry form. Rabbit breeding projects are subject to space available.
4. A pen of rabbits is three rabbits of the same sex, age, weight, breed, and variety. A trio of rabbits includes 1 Male and 2 Females.
5. Poultry entries will be judged according to the American Standard of Perfection. Entries will be marked down for deformities, or characteristics, which are detrimental to the vigor and vitality of the specimen, for reasons that contribute to lack of breed character and for removing parts of the birds, such as clipping wings of all breeds of chickens and turkeys and most waterfowl.
6. The superintendent of the poultry and rabbit divisions shall have the right to refuse entry to the showroom, or to remove from the same, diseased and unsightly animals.
7. Each poultry exhibitor is allowed a total of five (5) entries. Indicate breed on entry form.
8. Birds shown in a pen cannot be shown as singles.
9. **Grand Champion and Reserve Champion Poultry, and Grand Champion Fancy Rabbit and Grand Champion Meat Type Rabbit may be sold at the 4-H/FFA Livestock Market Sale.**
10. ANIMAL HEALTH AND THE USE OF ILLEGAL SUB-STANCES...See general rules, Health Requirements.
11. Cavy and hedgehog exhibits will be entered Thursday of fair week between 12:00 to 6:00 PM. These exhibits are under the direction of the Rabbit Superintendent. Ownership 60 days prior to fair. In the event of adverse weather exhibits may be allowed to only be on grounds during their scheduled classes. The Rabbit Superintendent shall make this decision. Should exhibits not be kept on grounds there should be some types of educational display for public display.
12. Each cavy and hedgehog exhibitor is allowed a total of five (5) entries. Indicate breed on entry.
13. Only those entries with blue ribbons will be considered for Champion/Reserve Champion ribbons and/or awards.
14. Rabbits and Cavies are judged according to the American Rabbit Breeders Association Standard of Perfection. Hedge-hogs are judged according to the International Hedgehog Association Standard of Perfection.

## **FFA & 4-H SMALL ANIMAL HERDSMANSHIP CONTEST**

Pre-entry not required for this class

The purpose of the Herdsmanship contest is to encourage exhibitors to care for their small animals and equipment properly and keep pens and animals clean and attractive at all times. Competition will be on club or chapter basis. An independent judge will examine the displays at least once daily. They will be judged on Friday and Saturday from 9:00 AM to 6:00 PM and Sunday from 9:00 AM to 2:00 PM. Scores will be posted daily in the barn and daily ribbons will be awarded to the high point club or chapter. Final awards will be based on total of daily scores of each division.

Basis for scoring:

1. Animals: 35 points - Arrangements, tying, cleanliness and grooming, bedding, regularity of feeding and watering.
2. Stalls and pens: 35 points - Orderliness of equipment and supplies, neatness and cleanliness of designated area during fair and post fair.
3. Educational effect: 10 points - Stall cards, legible, completeness of 4-H or FFA identification. To be scored and judged one time only
4. Exhibitors: 20 points - Appearance, attitude, courtesy, skill

**NOTE: ALL WORK TO BE DONE BY EXHIBITORS! ADULTS ARE PROHIBITED FROM HELPING.**

## **SMALL ANIMAL ROUND ROBIN GUIDELINES**

### **SUNDAY OF FAIR**

Two exhibitors from each species will participate. This will be the champion and reserve champion for that species. Remember that if there are FFA members, they must also be considered for the top showman spots.

1. An exhibitor that has qualified in more than one species must choose which species they will represent. This must be decided as soon as possible, so an alternate will be found to fill the vacant spot.
2. Superintendents will pick animals to be used for round robin.
3. Exhibitors will be asked to show each of the five small animal species: Cats, Dogs, Novelty Goats, Poultry, & Rabbits.
4. Judges will be the area superintendent or official species judge (if available). If an area superintendent has a child participating in the Round Robin, then the area superintendent of that species will designate a qualified individual to judge in their absence.
5. All contestants will be assigned a number for identification by the judges.
6. Contestants will be scored on their ability to show the respective animals and their knowledge of those animals. They will be scored on a scale of 1 (low ability) to 10 (outstanding ability).
7. The contestant with the top score will be the winner. In the case of a tie, the judges will conference and immediately break the tie.

**NOTE: ALL WORK TO BE DONE BY EXHIBITORS! Adult help is prohibited. Violation will result in forfeit of points.**

## **SMALL ANIMAL FITTING AND SHOWING CONTEST**

Points allowed: Blue – 100 Red – 75 White – 50

The purpose of the small animal fitting and showing contest is to create more interest and better knowledge of fitting, training, handling and showing small animals. Breed, type and conformation are not considered. The exhibitor must do all training and preparation of the animal prior to and during the show. All 4-H and FFA members carrying small animal projects **MUST** enter this contest. Past winners are not excluded. Each exhibitor **MUST** show their own animal. Dogs are required to use the following equipment: show lead or choke chain and lead of any length. Trophies and rosettes will be given to the Grand Champion Showman and to the Reserve Champion Showman in each 4-H and FFA division in Lots 1 – 4.

Top Overall 4-H and FFA Showman will receive a trophy and will compete in the Small Animal Round Robin contest for Top Overall Showman. Check the schedule for dates and times for the individual contests.

# DOGS

---

1. Exhibitors will be judged in groups as divided by lots listed. Exception to the rule could occur if the superintendent feels that not enough FFA members are entered. They then will be combined with the Senior 4-H group.
2. If benching space is available, dogs may be kept on the grounds during the Fair. The Superintendent will have information concerning spaces and times allowed. If benching is allowed, an exhibition tag with completed information must be on display.
3. Dogs MUST be kept on leash at all times, except as directed by the judges.
4. Dogs must have DA2PL (distemper, hepatitis & rabies) shots for all dogs over six months. A record needs to be provided to the Superintendent upon entry.
5. Dogs must be well groomed. Coat should be glossy and combed. Animal must be free from dirt, dandruff, fleas, lice and ticks. Ears are to be free of dirt, wax and odor. Nails should be short and feet should not have mats between toes.
6. Handlers must be neatly groomed & appropriately dressed. For proper dress attire refer to WSU 4-H Dog Project Showmanship Guide.
7. In case of a tie, there will be a runoff. A Top of Class rib-bon may be awarded in each lot. A special award in each age group may be awarded for the highest score in Fitting and Showing and highest score in Dog Obedience. A Best Show-man Award in each age group may be given for the highest combined scores of Fitting & Showing and Obedience. These awards are given at the judge's discretion. Point scale for ribbon placing to be posted. A trophy will be offered in each age group within a class, with an Overall Fitting & Showing award for 4-H. A trophy and rosette will be awarded the Top Overall in Fitting and Showing 4-H/ FFA and a trophy and rosette for the Top and a rosette to the Reserve in each age division.
8. A member may show one dog for Fitting & Showing and another dog for Obedience. To qualify for the state fair in Obedience, a member must show the same dog in Fitting & Showing and Obedience and receive blue ribbons in both classes. To qualify for the state fair in Agility, a member must show the same dog in Fitting & Showing and Agility and receive blue ribbons in both classes.
9. Champion/Reserve Champion ribbons and/or awards WILL NOT be awarded for animals that do not receive a blue ribbon.
10. Entries in Dog Obedience classes are limited to ONLY ONE CLASS.
11. Treats and/or toys may be used in all Fitting and Showing classes. If toys are used, they must not distract other handlers or dogs in the ring. Treats and/or toys are NOT allowed to be used in Obedience, Rally or Agility Classes.
12. Everyone is expected to clean up after their dogs. Bags will be provided.

### **DOG OBEDIENCE**

All classes follow the Washington State Dog Program Guidelines, see these guidelines for further details. Obedience trials demonstrate the dog's ability to follow specified routines in the obedience ring as well as to show that the dogs have been trained to behave in the home, in public places and in the presence of other dogs in a manner that will reflect credit on the sport of obedience at all times and under all conditions. All contestants in a class are required to perform the same exercises in the same way so that the relative quality of the various performances may be compared and scored.

Equipment: 6-Foot Lead and properly fitted choke chain or a flat collar.

Points allowed: Blue – 100 Red – 75 White – 50.

A trophy and rosette will be awarded to the Top Overall Obedience 4-H/FFA and a rosette to the Reserve.

### **CLASS 286 – PRENOVICE**

Heel on Leash, Figure 8 on leash, Stand for examination on Leash, Recall on Leash, Long Sit (1 min) on Leash, Long Down (3 min) on Leash.

### **CLASS 287 – NOVICE**

Heel on Leash & Figure 8 on Leash, Stand for Examination off Leash, Heel Free, Recall, Long Sit (1 min), Long Down (3 min).

### **CLASS 288 – ADVANCED NOVICE**

Heel on Leash, Stand for Exam, Call dog, Heel Free & Figure 8, Drop on Recall, Long Sit (3 min), Handler across ring, Long Down (3 min), Out of Sight.

### **CLASS 289 – GRADUATE NOVICE**

Heel Free & Figure 8, Drop on Recall, Dumbbell Recall, Recall over High Jump, Recall over Broad Jump, Long Down (3 min) Out of Sight

### **CLASS 290 – OPEN**

Heel Free & Figure 8, Drop on Recall, Retrieve on Flat, Retrieve over High Jump, Broad Jump, Long Sit (3 min), Out of Sight, Long Down (5 min) Out of Sight

### **CLASS 291 – GRADUATE OPEN**

Signal Exercises, Scent Discrimination, Directed Retrieve, Moving Stand & Examination, Go Out, Directed Jumping

### **CLASS 292 – UTILITY**

Signal Exercise, Scent Discrimination, Directed Retrieve, Moving Stand & Examination, Directed Jumping

### **CLASS 293 – VERSATILITY**

In this class the dog must perform two exercises from Novice, Open, & Utility. Name of two exercises from each of the above are randomly placed in an envelope. Prior to the start of judging, handlers pick an envelope thus determining the exercises they must complete. See the Versatility section of the "AKC Obedience Regulations" for further description.

### **RALLY**

Rally is a sport in which the dog and handler complete a course that has been designed by the rally superintendent. The judge tells the handler to begin, and the dog and handler proceed at their own pace through a course of designated stations (10-20, depending on the level). Each of these stations has a sign providing instructions regarding the next skill that is to be performed. Scoring is not as



rigorous as traditional obedience. All exercises are judged on leash, and all dogs must enter and leave the ring on leash. The leash must be made of fabric or leather and needs to be long enough to provide adequate slack.

Points allowed: Blue – 100 Red – 75 White – 50.

A trophy and rosette will be awarded to the Top Overall Rally 4-H/FFA and a rosette to the Reserve.

1. Not ALL equipment will be available at Fair time and the courses will be designed accordingly.
2. Dogs must be 12 months of age or older. Handler and dog must have completed at least 6 agility classes within the current 4-H year before they compete in a dog agility trial. 4-H members/handlers are responsible for completing their Asotin County 4-H Agility Release Form. 4-H members/handlers need to present their completed Asotin County 4-H Agility Release Form to the Dog Superintendent before they are able to participate in agility trials. The Asotin County 4-H Dog Agility Release Form is available through the Extension Office.
3. Optional attire: Shorts, Tennis shoes and short sleeves
4. Every dog MUST be on a leash at all times except when running on course.
5. Absolutely NO collars on Open and Elite Dogs.
6. Absolutely NO tags of any kind on the collar of a Novice dog.
7. All exhibitors are expected to treat their dogs with kindness, no scruffing or scolding.
8. Sportsmanlike conduct is expected.
9. Blind dogs are not eligible to compete in Agility at fair. Any other dogs that cannot perform obstacles safely are also ineligible.

**Regular Agility**

Agility is patterned after equestrian show jumping. Dog agility combines the elements of a dog's agility, briskness, confidence, and a handler's control over an obstacle course designed for dogs.

Optional attire: Short sleeves, shorts, and running shoes.

Points allowed: Blue – 100 Red – 75 White – 50.

A trophy and rosette will be awarded to Top Overall Agility 4-H/FFA and a rosette to the Reserve.

**CLASS 93A - STANDARD ELEMENTARY**

10 - 12 obstacles, which may include A-Frame, Pause Table, Open Tunnel, Closed Tunnel, Dog Walk, Bar Jumps (3 to 5) and Broad Jump. Approved collars are required. Leashes are optional.

**CLASS 93B - STANDARD PRE-NOVICE**

12 - 14 obstacles, which may include A-Frame, Dog Walk, Pause Table, Open Tunnel, Closed Tunnel, Tire Jump, Broad Jump, Bar Jumps (4 to 6), wing jumps, panel jump, and/or double bar. All dogs to be shown off leash, use of an approved collar is mandatory.

**CLASS 93 C – NOVICE**

13 - 15 obstacles, which may include A-Frame, Pause Table, Open Tunnel, Closed Tunnel, Dog Walk, Tire Jump, Broad Jump, Double Bar Jump, 6 Weave Poles, See Saw, Bar Jump (3 to 5) and/or wing jumps, panel jumps. All dogs to be shown off leash, with or without a collar.

### **CLASS 93D – OPEN**

This class will use AKC regulations for trials. If a conflict of rules, the 4-H rules supersede the AKC regulations. Equipment requirements are the same as the novice class, except for the following additions -- additional bar jumps to meet the required number of obstacles, and weave poles (6-12 if available). All dogs to be shown off leash, with or without collar

### **CLASS 93E - STANDARD EXCELLENT**

This class will use AKC regulations for trials. If a conflict of rules, the 4-H rules supersede the AKC regulations. Equipment requirements are the same as the novice class, except for the following additions -- additional bar jumps to meet the required number of obstacles, and weave poles (6-12) if available). All dogs to be shown off leash, with or without collar.

### **JUMPER AGILITY**

Agility is patterned after equestrian show jumping. Dog agility combines the elements of a dog's agility, briskness, confidence, and a handler's control over 12-15 jumps in an obstacle course designed for dogs.

Optional attire: Short sleeves, shorts, and running shoes.

Points allowed: Blue – 100 Red – 75 White – 50

### **CLASS 94A - JUMPERS PRE-NOVICE**

10 - 12 obstacles which may include Bar Jumps, Broad Jump, Open Tunnel (1 to 3), Closed Tunnel and no weave poles. All dogs to be shown off leash, use of an approved collar is mandatory.

### **CLASS 94B - JUMPERS NOVICE**

12 - 14 obstacles which may include Weave Poles (6), Broad Jump, Double Bar Jump, Bar Jumps, Open Tunnel (1 to 3), Closed Tunnel, Tire Jump. All dogs to be shown off leash, with or without a collar.

### **CLASS 94C - JUMPERS OPEN**

## **CATS**

---

Cats MUST BE on the grounds by FRIDAY of FAIR at 2PM. Showing Begins at 4 PM. Exhibitors will be judged in groups as divided by lots listed. Exceptions to this rule could occur if the superintendent feels there are not enough FFA members entered. They then will be combined with the Senior 4-H group.

1. Cats MUST be kept on leash or in carrier at all times.
2. Cats are not to be kept on the grounds overnight.

3. Cats must be current on all shots, including distemper, respiratory virus and rabies. Cats must have been wormed and a record of this needs to be provided to the Superintendent upon entry.
4. Cats and handler must be well groomed. Coat should be glossy and brushed. Animal must be free from dirt, wax, odor and mites.
5. Equipment: Must have a harness and lightweight leash, 6 feet long.
6. In case of a tie, there will be a runoff. A trophy and rosette will be awarded to the Top Overall Obedience 4-H/FFA Showman and a rosette to the Reserve.

Special Awards for highest scores in Cat Obedience.

The Cat Costume Contest Award is at the Judge's discretion.

## **DEPARTMENT 300 EQUINE**

HORSE SHOW, APRIL 21 & 22 - FREE ADMISSION

Reference to 4-H/FFA Rules and Regulations:

1. This horse show will be conducted in accordance with the new PNW 4-H HORSE CONTEST GUIDE, updated by the Pacific NW Extension October 1, 2015. THERE ARE CHANGES AND ADDITIONS BY THE STATE.
2. Asotin County 4-H horse projects are encouraged to use the 4-H Horse Project Publication known as the PNW 587.
3. To show a horse at the Asotin County Fair, 4-H members must file a horse certificate with the Asotin County Extension Office 90 days prior to the 4-H/FFA horse show.
4. A current photograph of the horse must be attached to the horse certificate.

5. Regardless of the number of certificates filed, only two horses may be used for the 4-H/FFA horse show.
6. For the horse show, only 2 horses are allowed per youth; ONE horse may be used for all performance divisions; and ONE horse may be used for all western games divisions. Members may not cross divisions with either horse. Each horse must be shown in Showmanship under the division it is signed up in.
7. Asotin County 4-H Horse Show enforces the Pacific Northwest 4-H Horse Contest Guide rules regarding members only riding the project horse 90 days prior to showing at the Asotin County Fair. Care, control and training should fall to the project owner exclusively during the 90-day window before fair. A request of variance to the 90 day ruling must be made in writing and present to the Horse Leaders' Committee for approval 90 days or more prior to the fair. NO recreational use by non-project members will be permitted in that 90-day window before fair.
8. To show at the Asotin County Fair, a member must have attended at least six club meetings.
9. If a 4-H/FFA members' horse cannot be used due to death, severe injury or disease, the member must have a statement from a veterinarian and the 4-H member's leader explaining why. The Horse Leaders Council will review the statement and approve the use of a substitute horse. The member may show at the county level, but will not qualify to exhibit at state fair.
10. All riders must be dressed appropriately as stated in the Pacific Northwest 4-H Horse Contest Guide.
11. All tack and equipment must meet the requirements as stated in the Pacific Northwest 4-H Horse Contest Guide.
12. 4-H Equestrian Headgear must follow Pacific Northwest 4-H Horse Contest Guide descriptions.
13. Equipment check will be prior to each class. This will include helmets. Equipment checks will be made by the designated person by the Horse Leaders' Committee.
14. DRUGGING: Asotin county Horse Show enforces the Pacific Northwest 4-H Horse Contest Guide rules concerning this practice.
