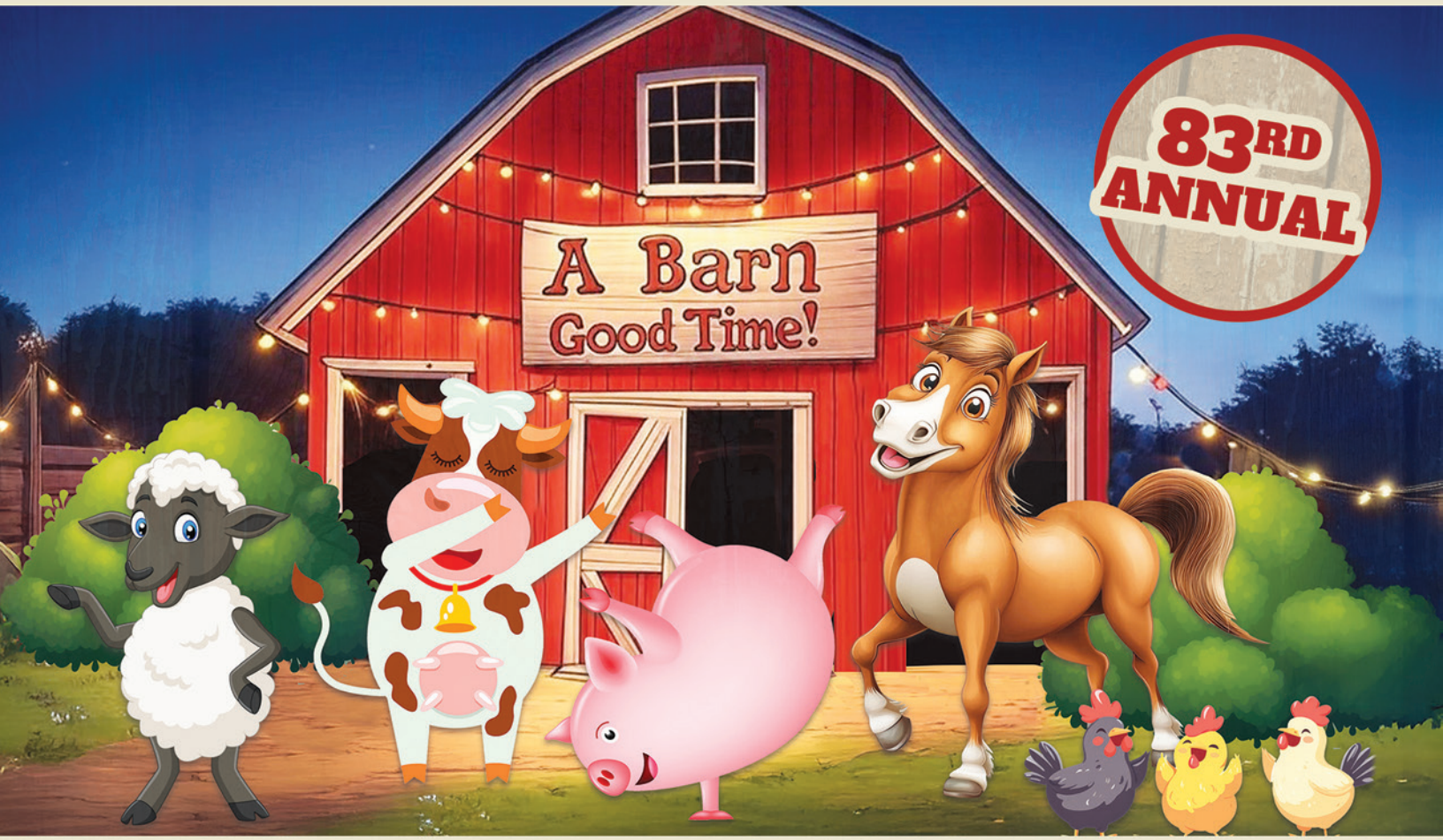

### Breeding Stock and Small Animal Removal on Sunday Of Fair New Procedure

Breeding Stock and Small Animal pick up will be from 4pm-5:30pm Sunday of Fair.

Due to the number of animals being picked up there may be wait times.

All tents, panels, benches and tables will be removed by 3:30pm Sunday of Fair

### The Process—Procedure

1. All small animal/breeding project trailers will be allowed to enter through the **front gate starting at 4pm** and park in the steer show arena. **No trailers will be allowed on scale side of barns, this is for market animal haulers only. No Trailers will be allowed to park by the sheep/goat barn.**
2. All breeding stock and small animals will be loaded in the beef arena and once loaded are required to exit through the **back gate immediately.**
3. Please merge with the market animal haulers when exiting the back gates.

Check in time is Sunday April 27th from 9:30am-10:30am, Check in underneath the Announcer Booth on the upper level. All contestants must be checked in prior to 10:30am

**\*\*No Exceptions\*\*.**

At Check-in Parents/Guardians will sign a release waiver and pick up contestant numbers.

1. Each number of events has a limited number of contestants on a first come first-serve basis. Upon an event being filled, contestants will be notified of entry acceptance or non-availability.
2. All Kids Rodeo contestants in the arena at any time **MUST** have on western attire: Long Sleeve Shirt, long Pants/J Jeans, Cowboy Hat & Boots.
3. Mutton Bustin', should bring their own equipment and wear the proper safety attire: Helmet, vest, and mouth guard to compete.
4. Mutton Bustin' Riders must be ages 4-7 years old as of April 28th, 2025, and not weigh more than 60-lbs. No exceptions. It is on a first come first-serve basis. Riders will ride out of the Mutton Bustin' Chutes for 8-seconds. All riders will be timed and judged. The Top 10 riders from Saturday will compete in the championship on Sunday. The top 6-riders will go on to compete at the Lewiston Roundup in September 2025.
5. Only one parent will be allowed behind the chutes and in the arena at a time.
6. Calf Riders and Steer Riders must have and wear the proper safety protective equipment. All Contestants **MUST** provide their own safety riding equipment. All contestants must wear a helmet approved for rodeo events, contestants must wear an Athletic Protective Mouthpiece while competing and contestants must wear a vest designed to protect the chest and back while competing.
7. **The Calf Scramble Important: Ages 8 to 13-years.** A ribbon will be placed around the calves' **TAIL**. The first team to remove and return the ribbon to the judge located in the chalk circle and hand the ribbon to the judge will be the 1st place winning team **(No Ropes & No Horses will be allowed in the arena.)**
8. **The Calf Scramble Important : Ages 14 to 18-years.** A ribbon will be placed around the calves' **TAIL**. The first team to remove and return the ribbon to the judge located in the chalk circle and hand the ribbon to the judge will be the 1st place winning team **(No Ropes & No Horses will be allowed in the arena.)**
9. All barrel racing contestants must be on horseback before entering the arena to compete. Hats must stay on top of contestant's head thru the entry gate. If a contestant loses their hat before entering the In-gate they will be Disqualified.
10. Pee Wee Barrel Racers must be a single horse and rider to make a qualifying time. OR they may be led by 1-adult on foot. The person leading the horse may not break the eye, starting or stopping.

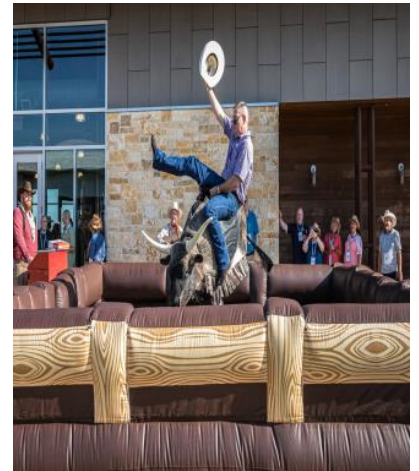

## **EXERCISING THE RIGHT OF FREE EXPRESSION**

The use of the fairgrounds, during the annual Asotin County Fair or other designated times, for the purpose of exercising the right of free expression shall not be abridged. The use shall not compromise public safety, interfere with the orderly movement of fair patrons, or abridge the rights of other users of the fairgrounds. The following requirements are intended to accommodate these interests.

1. No person on the Asotin County Fairgrounds shall distribute literature, display signs for the primary purpose of communication to other users of the fairgrounds or solicit petition signatures without permission from the fair board and without an identification badge issued by the fair board. The identification badge shall be issued upon presentation of a written application containing the following: The name, address and telephone number of the applicant and sponsoring organization, if any. A description of the proposed activity. The date, hour, and duration of the proposed activity.
2. No person on the Asotin County Fairgrounds shall solicit funds or offer any merchandise or services for sale except authorized vendors approved by the Asotin County Fair Board.
3. No person on the Asotin County Fairgrounds, unless participating in a scheduled event or activity or unless separately licensed as a concessionaire and authorized by a licensing agreement shall: Employ sound or voice amplifying device for any purpose. Use a table, chair, stand on other structure to conduct activities described in this section of exercising the right of free expression. Engage in a dance, chant or other performance intended to attract public notice.
4. Activities described in this section of exercising the right of free expression shall be confined to areas of the fairgrounds that are open to the public, following areas are included: Parking areas, Areas of animals, barns, ticket counters, or other concession facilities and patrons waiting in line.

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## **AIMS & PURPOSES OF THE ASOTIN COUNTY FAIR, FAIRBOARD, & VOLUNTEERS**

Provide county youth with an educational experience relating to 4-H and FFA projects, activities, personal skills, and accomplishments.

Provide recognition and inspiration to county youth and youth leaders for encouragement toward greater achievement.

Provide a challenge and opportunity for county youth to broaden their relationship with other youth and with the 4-H and FFA programs.

Provide an opportunity for youth and county citizens and the public to display their projects.

Provide an educational opportunity for the public to learn from judging of displayed produce, foods, clothing, flowers, photography, and arts & crafts & livestock exhibits.

Serve to foster community spirit as volunteers unite in a common effort to provide a colorful, pleasant, and educational event for the public.

# No Dogs Allowed on the Fairgrounds Except:

4-H/FFA Project Dogs and Guide Dogs.

**RCW 49.60.040 defines a dog guide as a “dog that is trained for the purpose of guiding blind persons or a dog that is trained for the purpose of assisting hearing impaired persons.” RCW 49.60.040 defines service animal as “an animal that is trained for the purpose of assisting or accommodating a disabled person’s sensory, mental, or physical disability.”**

Service animals are utilized by persons with a variety of disabilities and in many different ways. Service animals may lead blind people or serve as the ears of a deaf person. They may also carry and pick up items, be used for balance, and provide warnings of impending seizures or low blood sugar. Service animals may allow persons with anxiety disorders, PTSD or other emotional illnesses to function in society, by alerting their handlers to avoid anxiety triggers, by recognizing and blocking behaviors, or by stimulating the person to “snap back” to a conscious state. Service animals can remind handlers that it is time to take medication, and can summon help in the case of fainting or a seizure. The ways in which persons with disabilities use service animals are growing and evolving as we discover additional ways in which animals can be utilized by persons with disabilities.

Emotional support animals, comfort animals, and therapy dogs are not service animals under Washington State Law. Other species of animals, whether wild or domestic, trained or untrained, are not considered service animals either. The work or tasks performed by a service animal must be directly related to the individual's disability. It does not matter if a person has a note from a doctor that states that the person has a disability and needs to have the animal for emotional support. A doctor's letter does not turn an animal into a service animal.

A service dog is protected by federal and state laws to be allowed access to public places such as stores, restaurants, theaters, etc. (anywhere it's handler would otherwise be allowed access to). However, there are some rules and behavior guidelines the handler must follow. The laws not only protect the handler and service animal from being denied access to those places, but also protects business owners from unruly service animals and/or “fraudulent” service animals. A business owner has the right to deny access to a service animal and handler team if they pose a direct threat to the health and/or safety to the establishment's patrons or display poor or unacceptable behaviors. Below is a list of basic rules that must be followed in order to maintain access rights:

## Rules and Behavior Guidelines

- Washington State follows the ADA requirements for the service animal to be under the complete control of it's handler. This could be achieved through the use of a leash, harness, or other tether mechanism. However, in cases where either the handler is unable to hold a tether because of a disability or its use would interfere with the service animal's safe, effective performance of work or tasks, the service animal must be under the handler's control by some other means, such as voice control.
- The service animal MUST be housebroken- urinating or defecating in public places that are not appropriate would be grounds for removal of the team from the establishment.
- The service animal must be vaccinated and licensed according to local state and county laws. Some counties will waive the fee of licensing under certain circumstances for service animals.
- The handler is responsible for the care of the service animal's needs. This means they are solely responsible for the feeding, watering and cleaning up after the service animal in an establishment.

Here are some basic guidelines to follow for the proper behavior of a service animal:

- Follow the “4 on the floor” rule. For example: no jumping, standing up on hind legs, or being placed in shopping carts.
- Keep a quiet profile. In some cases, a service dog may be trained to bark for an alert, which is perfectly acceptable. However, it is unacceptable for the dog to uncontrollably bark, growl or whine while in an establishment.
- Maintain control of the service animal at all times. Most service animals are trained to stay close to its handler (i.e. under a chair, bench or table when the handler is sitting, next to or in front of the handler in a “sit” or “down” when the handler is standing stationary). Allowing the service animal to run around or away from it's handler is unacceptable.

Another thing to note is the size of the service animal. In some circumstances, a service animal may need to maintain contact or closeness to the handler to detect an alert. In this case, a smaller service animal may be held or carried by the handler instead of walked.

**HEALTH REQUIREMENTS:** Q-Fever is a bacterial organism commonly shed by sheep, goats, and cattle. Goats and sheep in the last 14 days of pregnancy, and female goat and sheep are most likely to be shedding this organism. This disease is communicable to humans. Female goats and sheep within the last 14 days of pregnancy, and 14 days following the birth of live or dead lambs/kids are not allowed to be exhibited at the Asotin County Fair.

1. Washington livestock requires no vaccinations or tests for entry into the Asotin County Fair.
2. Weigh in veterinarians (chosen by the Fair Board ) may inspect all classes of livestock and poultry (including horses, pet animals, fur-bearing animals, pigeons, ducks, geese and turkeys, before they are exhibited, to determine that the livestock and poultry are free from infectious or contagious disease and ectoparasites.
3. Weigh in veterinarians WILL reject any animals with infectious or contagious disease or ectoparasites. Exhibitors should be aware that RINGWORM, WARTS, PINKEYE, STRANGLES, CONTAGIOUS ECTHYMA, SCABIES, LICE, MITES, TICKS AND FLEAS fall into these categories.
4. No animals from a quarantined area/premise will be permitted to enter the fair.
5. ALL OUT-OF-STATE ENTRIES must comply with the State of Washington import regulations. A health certificate must be issued by an accredited veterinarian from the state of origin for all out of state livestock and poultry entries.
5. Only upon a veterinarian's and a barn superintendent's approval shall tranquilizers, antibiotics, etc., be used or administered by a vet on market animals.
6. The Asotin County Fair requires all female sheep and goats and all intact male sheep and goats to have official USDA National Scrapie Eradication program-assigned flock identification available during vet check-in. This may include either a tag, tattoo, or microchip (with reader provided by exhibitor). Veterinarians will not allow unmarked animals through vet check.

Our mission is to help educate the Asotin County 4-H and FFA participants with their market animals – primarily lambs, meat goats, hogs & steers.

We conduct the early weigh-ins and tagging of all animals that are eligible for the Livestock Sale at the fair each year. We also handle the marketing and bookkeeping after the final weigh-in and livestock sale.

We are a volunteer board and most of us have been in 4-H and/or FFA ourselves or have kids who have gone through or are going through these great programs.

## MARKET LIVESTOCK SALE

4-H and FFA exhibitors of market livestock are entitled to sell ONE large market animal through the Asotin County Fair 4-H & FFA Livestock Auction Sale on Saturday at 4:30 PM. To be eligible for the sale, all animals must have been weighed/tagged at the official weigh-in. Each Exhibitor MUST be present with their animal at the sale. Exceptions only with Fair Board's authorization.

Final Weigh-in Market Steers [4/24/2025](#) Minimum Weight 1,100 pounds

Final Weigh-in Market Swine [4/24/2025](#) Minimum Weight 230 pounds, Maximum Weight 300-pounds(Payout to 290 pounds)

Final Weigh-in Market Lambs [4/24/2025](#) Minimum weight 110 pounds

Final Weigh-in Market Goats [4/24/2025](#) Minimum weight 70 pounds

STATE BRAND REGULATION A certificate of permit for hauling cattle must be made out before leaving home. Cattle with the brand of the previous owner must also have a bill of sale signed by the previous owner. The certificates of permit and bills of sale will be given to the weigh master at the scales at the final weigh in.

### ASOTIN COUNTY FAIR 4-H and FFA MARKET LIVESTOCK SALE RULES

1. Currently enrolled Asotin County 4-H or FFA members may exhibit ONE market animal. The exhibitor must bring only one animal to the Official Fair Weigh-in on Thursday of fair week. An exhibitor may exhibit a second animal in breeding classes. Species limitation does not include rabbits, poultry or horses. If animal is not a tagged market animal, it will not be weighed.
2. Scales will remain open to exhibitors until 6pm Wednesday of fair week, and re-open at 12pm Thursday for Official Fair Weigh-in.
3. NO market animals will be stalled prior to Official Fair Weigh-in.
4. A WSU Health Record Form (Quality Assurance Form) must be submitted (signed and properly completed) by all 4-H and FFA market beef, market goat, market sheep and market swine exhibitors at the time that they weigh in their animal on Thursday afternoon. Individuals that do not have a completed Health Record Form will not be able to sell their animal through the livestock auction. The Official Fair (FINAL) Weigh-in will be between 12:00 and 6:00 PM on Thursday of fair week.
5. Scale weight, if not disputed, will be final. If disputed, a chance for re-weigh will be done immediately. The animal will be removed from scale, the scale will be balanced, and the animal will be re-weighed
6. A slip with exhibitor's name and animal's weight will be available at the scales.
7. Sales committee is responsible for: Proof-reading sale order, setting auction order, bookkeeping, clerking, sales accounts, securing auctioneers, and securing support prices. Additionally, sales committee will be responsible for withholding trucking fees when needed, **marking all animals will begin at 2:30pm** to prepare for transportation, supervising/handling and loading of sale animals beginning Sunday at 4:30pm.\* Exhibitors are responsible for their projects up until the close of fair at 4pm. Although all animals **will be marked beginning at 2:30pm, all barns must be cleared of exhibitors by 4pm**. No vehicles will be allowed onto the fairgrounds to load out supplies and no cleaning of pens is allowed until Monday after fair.
8. 1% will be withheld from sale animals for casualty fund. **All exhibitors are strongly urged to purchase livestock liability insurance for their animals**. Market value will be determined by the auction support price for goats, sheep, hogs and beef. Rabbits and chickens will not be included as there is no support price offered at the auction. In case of buyer's default of payment for livestock purchased or individual participant support at the sale, funds may be transferred from the casualty fund to recover the loss, upon removal of the sales committee after Official Weigh-In is complete.
9. Brand Inspection: Actual cost per head for Brand Inspection will be responsibility of seller of market steers. (See "State Brand Regulation" paragraph above.)
10. Sale animal hauling fee will be held from exhibitor's checks when required.
11. Terms of Sale: Cash-terms 30 days, 1% pencil shrink on lambs, 3% pencil shrink on steers. No shrink on hogs
12. Sale order will be made from live placing of animals by barn superintendents and with cooperation of Extension office; and be submitted to the sales committee on Friday immediately following completion of all the market classes.
13. The fair board, has final say on all animals that go through the sale with the input of the Sales Committee & Superintendents. The president of the Sales Committee has final say on any changes in sale order. The Sales Committee has the right to refuse any bid.
14. No deformed, injured or cryptorchid animals will be sold. A licensed veterinarian will give his signed decision on paper.
15. Support price bids deadline is 1:00 PM on Saturday, bids to be opened at sales office. Bidders welcome at bid opening.
16. Animals will be sold in the following order: rabbits, chickens, goats, sheep, beef, and hogs., unless changed by the Sales Committee.
17. Barn Superintendents will be responsible for getting animals in sale ring.
18. All halters and safety chains (neck ropes) are to be left on steers until they are loaded out
19. Loading will be done by the Sales Committee, the barn superintendents, and their designated help at **4:30 PM. Loading out is not to begin before 4:30pm.**
20. Beef project owners MUST have a hauling slip and a Bill of Sale before the animal goes on the scale at final weigh-in.
21. Animals exceeding maximum weight at first weigh-in will not be tagged
22. Animals sold at the Market Sale will be held on the Fairgrounds until close of Fair on Sunday. The seller-exhibitor will be financially responsible for the animal and its care until 4pm Sunday of Fair.
23. **ONLY OFFICIALLY TAGGED ANIMALS WILL BE ALLOWED TO PARTICIPATE IN THE MARKET SALE.** Animals exceeding maximum weight at first weigh-in will not be tagged or be able to sell at the livestock auction.
24. All market livestock will be weighed and tagged on their respective dates as follows:  
\*\*8am-9:30am-[12/7/2024](#) - Market steers (3 maximum) will be weighed and tagged with an official ear tag in the right ear on the first Saturday of December. Maximum weight at first weigh-in is 1000 pounds.\* \*\*8am-11am- [1/25/2025](#) Market hogs (3 maximum) will be tagged with an official ear tag in the right ear on or before the fourth Saturday of January. Maximum weight at first weigh-in is 150 pounds. \*\*8am-11am - [2/22/2025](#) Market lambs and goats (3 maximum) will be weighed and tagged with an official ear tag in the right ear on the fourth Saturday. Maximum weight at first weigh-in is 110 pounds for lambs. Goat maximum weight at first weigh-in is 80 pounds. \*\*Animal weights that exceed maximum weight limits at first weigh-in will not be tagged and will not be weighed at final weigh-in.
25. All market animals not making minimum weight requirements at the Official Final Weigh-in at the fair on the Thursday will be re-tagged in the left ear at that time.

## 4-H & FFA EXHIBIT GENERAL RULES & REGULATIONS

### **4-H Shows First in Even Years, followed by FFA, FFA Show First in Odd Years, followed by 4-H**

1. All exhibitors must abide by the 4-H , FFA, & General rules for each department in which they exhibit.
2. All 4-H and FFA animal exhibits and other projects, Must be pre-entered online at: <https://asotincountyfair.fairentry.com>
3. All 4-H/FFA Exhibits must be pre-entered By April 5th, 2025. Exhibits must be entered using department, division and class listed in this exhibitor handbook. Exhibitors are responsible for correctly completing entry forms.
4. **Exhibitors are limited to one entry per class unless otherwise specified.**
5. Entry tags will be furnished. Incomplete tags will force disqualification of exhibit. Exhibitors age division will be noted on every tag. Age divisions are determined as of October 1st of current enrollment year. Cloverbuds are 5 to 7 years of age; Juniors are 8 to 10 years of age; Intermediates are 11 to 13 years of age; Seniors are 14 to less than 19 years of age.
6. Cloverbud members are limited on the amount of entries per department. Cloverbuds will receive a participation ribbon and are NOT eligible for any trophies or special awards. Cloverbuds will NOT be evaluated in a competitive fashion. Their role is for participation only. Refer to Extension Publication EM 4840 for further details.
7. Residents of Asotin County, and/or youth attending Asotin County schools or those who are enrolled in Asotin FFA or Clarkston FFA or Asotin 4-H, are eligible to compete in the Asotin County Fair. A non-resident who is enrolled in Asotin County 4-H and complies with project guidelines is eligible to compete in the Asotin County Fair. All others may compete in Open Class Events.
8. 4-H members MUST be enrolled in the projects they are exhibiting by November 15th of the program enrollment year. Those 4-H Members that did not get enrolled by the deadline, must come to the fair board and ask permission to show at the fair, the exhibitor must provide the reason for not getting signed up in time.
9. All exhibits must have been made since the previous year's Asotin County Fair. 4-H exhibits MUST NOT have been made as a school project. School projects may be entered as open class. Exceptions will be made if the exhibit was made as an Asotin County 4-H School Enrichment program.
10. Exhibits are placed on exhibit at the owner's risk. Supervision during public hours is provided. The Asotin County Fair and its volunteers are not responsible for theft or damages to exhibits.
11. All exhibits will be evaluated using the Danish System, according to merit. Awards (blue, red & white) will only be given to exhibits of merit. The Danish System of evaluation is based upon established standards of quality for each type of product. In this system, each exhibit is evaluated according to how well meets the standard rather than how well it compares with other exhibits. It does not compare one person's work to another. The evaluation is made against a project standard. The judge evaluates whether the requirements have been met. Stickers ribbons are awarded according to the degree that the member's project meets those standards. A participation ribbon may be awarded to an exhibitor whose work fulfills the minimum qualifications.
12. Exhibits should be picked up from 3:00pm to 7:00pm the Monday following fair. For exhibits left after 7:00pm on Monday, exhibitors will need to contact Peggy Hansford at [hansfordpeggy@yahoo.com](mailto:hansfordpeggy@yahoo.com) or 208-791-1451
13. Any exhibits removed before 3:00pm on Monday will forfeit their premium money and awards.
14. 4-H and FFA groups have been assigned areas for Fairground cleanup. Groups MUST do pre-fair and post fair cleanup in their assigned areas. Pen areas that are not cleaned by the second Sunday after fair will be charged a fee of \$20 per pen. All premium checks will be withheld for the entire club or group until the fee is paid.
15. ALL Adults are prohibited from preparation of livestock and the cleaning of stalls or pens at the fair for their children or club members. These activities ARE the responsibility of the exhibitors. Other Asotin County 4-H & FFA exhibitors may help each other (but may not do all the work) while preparing their exhibit. Exceptions can be made for Fair Royalty if they are attending other fair related responsibilities. Arrangements must be made with the barn superintendent in advance for this exception.

## 4-H & FFA EXHIBIT GENERAL RULES & REGULATIONS CONTINUED

16. All exhibitors must dress tastefully and conservatively. Bare feet and exposed midriffs are not allowed. All shirts must have at least three finger width straps at the shoulders, No Tank Tops, mesh or see through (sheer) clothing is allowed for showing. Undergarments may not be exposed. Clothing that advertises tobacco, drugs, alcohol, gang affiliation, sexually explicit messages or obscenities will not be allowed. All clothing and shoes must be clean and in good repair. Exhibitors will not participate in the Asotin County Fair unless they acknowledge and comply with this dress code. If, in the opinion of the activity or event officials, an exhibitor does not comply, that exhibitor shall be given one opportunity to correct the problem. If the exhibitor fails to correct the issue, they will be asked to leave the activity or event and forfeit all awards and premiums.

Official FFA Dress: FFA Jacket - zipped to the top, Official FFA Scarf/Tie, White button-up shirt with collar (not a polo!), Jean Pants & Dark Colored Belt, & Non-tennis shoes (preferably boots or work boots)

17. Superintendents are responsible for disqualifying any unsatisfactory exhibits.

18. 4-H & FFA ANIMAL RULES: Any large animal exhibit at the Asotin County Fair may be used in a livestock judging event. The exhibitor will have their animal ready to show at the request of the barn superintendent. The Asotin County Fair Board, Asotin County 4-H Leaders, and Asotin FFA and Clarkston FFA Chapters are not liable for any accident or injury that may occur while an animal is on exhibit. If an exhibitor refuses to have their animal in the event, they will be disqualified from the show and forfeit any premium money or awards.

- A. All livestock exhibitors must have proof of ownership, certificate,.
- B. All livestock Exhibitors must compete in Showmanship and Market Quality classes. Exhibitors who do not show their own animal will not receive credit/premiums or awards for any/all classes entered. NO EXCEPTIONS unless Brought before the Fair Board Prior to fair.
- C. Showmanship will be held in accordance with Extension Publication EM 1982: General Rules for Junior Livestock Shows.
- D. Exhibitors are expected to furnish their own hay, grain, water pails and feed troughs.
- E. All animals must remain on exhibit until 4:00pm on Sunday of fair and will be fed and watered during this time. Failure to care for animals will result in forfeiture of premium money and a \$100.00 fine. 4-H members will also be subject to disciplinary action of the 4-H Livestock Leader's Council.
- F. Animal Health and the use of illegal substances: The use of illegal drugs and/or improper use of animal health products, or foreign substances is not tolerated in the Washington State 4-H Youth Development Program or at the Asotin County Fair. Extension personnel, 4-H Volunteers, and Fair Volunteers have the responsibility to report any illegal substance or misuse of any drug or medication. Additionally, there are Federal penalties for using illegal substances in animals that are entering the nation's food supply. The Asotin County Fair Board has adopted this policy for all animal exhibitors.
- H. Asotin County Fair, 4-H & FFA will adhere to the National Show Ring Code of Ethics.
- I. Mistreatment of animals while on the fairgrounds, improper handling, unsanitary conditions, or lack of proper nutrition will constitute immediate removal from the fairgrounds. Review of such action will be brought before a committee of fair superintendents, and fair Board. The judgement of the committee will be final.
- J. Any animal considered unsafe will come before a committee of fair superintendents, and fair board for review and possible dismissal from the grounds. The judgement of the committee will be final.
- K. **An Asotin County Fair stall card will be provided for each animal exhibit. Stall cards MUST be completed and displayed above or near each exhibit no later than 9:00am Friday morning of fair. Animals will not be allowed to be shown unless this is completed. Stall cards must be left up until the Monday after fair.**
- L. No Tack removal from the barns on Sunday after fair closes. Everyone must be out of the barns by 4:00 PM on Sunday to facilitate ease of animal load out. Remember: at close of fair on Sunday – there is no cleaning of the stalls until Monday after fair. Please leave stall cards in place!
- M. Cleaning may begin on Monday after fair and must be completed by the second Sunday after the fair.  
**Cleaning of all pens must be checked off by a Fair Board member.**

## 2025 EXHIBIT & PROJECT ENTRY INFORMATION

1. Anyone entering any article/project in the Asotin County Fair must complete and entry form.
2. Entries for 4-H & FFA Projects must be pre-entered at: **[www.asotincountyfair.fairentry.com](http://www.asotincountyfair.fairentry.com) by April 4th, 2025**
3. Open Class entries will be done on entry forms handed out at time of exhibit entry. Please print legibly or use **mailing address** labels. Please complete entry form entirely with the department (example flowers), Age Division, Division Number & Class Number.
4. Each exhibit entry must be entered separately.
5. All entries must be picked up on the Monday after Fair from 3:00pm-7:00pm. Any exhibits left after 7:00pm on Monday are left at the owner's own risk. If you are unable to pick up your entry on the Monday after fair please contact Peggy Hansford 208-791-1451.
6. Exhibitor Premium checks will be mailed out in June. If entry forms are not legible and able to read, the Asotin County Fair Board is not responsible for delivery of premium checks. All entry forms must have first name, last name and **complete mailing address**.
7. Each Department has number of entry limits allowed by each exhibitors.
8. Fair Superintendents and Fair Board members reserve the right to reject any entries brought in to exhibit.
9. Still life & Livestock entry problems that arise concerning any entry in the fair are to be brought before the livestock superintendent or hall superintendent in that area entered. If the problem cannot be resolved at that level, the superintendent over that department will contact the Fair Board President, the Fair Board President will then bring the issue to the board members to resolve.
10. **Any use of alcohol or drugs, or being found under the influence of drugs or alcohol** while on the Asotin County Fairgrounds by an exhibitor will result in automatic dismissal from the Fairgrounds. The person will be turned over to the proper authorities and parents of underage exhibitors will be notified to remove any animals or entries from the fairgrounds. Youth exhibitors **WILL NOT BE** allowed to sell their animal at the Livestock Sale.

### Dress Code

All exhibitors must be appropriately dressed when: showing their animal, during livestock judging classes, or selling their animal. **The following dress code WILL be strictly enforced:** Jeans or Slacks with a LONG sleeve shirt or blouse that is tucked in, and if in FFA their jacket & tie. Shirts and Blouses are to be buttoned to within 1 button from the top. Boots are HIGHLY recommended, but clean, heavy athletic shoes that are laced to the top and tied or a similar leather shoe can be substituted. All clothing should be clean and in good repair. Jewelry is discouraged due to safety hazards.

**NO hats are to be worn while showing, No exceptions. Premium money will be withheld.**

Pre-entry Required for all Livestock Classes. Enter Market Animals for fair on Thursday [April 24th, 2025](#) from 12pm-6pm, Line up in main parking lot. Breeding and open Class Livestock check in with the barn superintendent.

**4-H & FFA Large Animal—Barb Appleford Memorial—Herdsmanship Contest:** The purpose of the herdsman's contest is to encourage exhibitors to care for livestock, pens, and equipment properly, to always keep stalls and animals clean and attractive. Competition will be on a club or chapter basis. Herdsman's judges will examine each club/chapters livestock exhibits at least once daily. Their score will be totaled and averaged. **The exhibits will be judged on Friday and Saturday from 9am – 6pm and Sunday from 9am – 2pm.** Scores will be posted daily at a designated location in each barn. Final awards will be based on total of daily scores of each division and will be awarded Sunday afternoon. In addition to each club or chapter's exhibit area, each club/chapter will be designated an area of the barn (e.g., wash rack, show arena, barn entrance, etc.) by the barn superintendent which must be kept neat and clean. These designated areas are also judged.

1. Animals 35 points. Arrangement, tying, cleanliness, grooming, clean bedding, regularity of feeding and watering.
2. Stalls/Pens and Walkways 35 points. Orderliness of equipment and supplies, neatness, and cleanliness of designated area during fair and post fair.
3. Educational Information 10 points. Posters and stall cards are legible and completed. 4-H or FFA Identification to be scored and judged one time only
4. Exhibitors 20 points. Appearance, attitude, courtesy, skill, and **Interaction With The Public.**

**NOTE: Herdman's Work TO BE DONE BY EXHIBITORS! Adult help is prohibited. Violation will result in forfeit of premium money.**





## 4-H & FFA LARGE ANIMAL EXHIBIT DEPARTMENT Beef, Swine, Sheep, & Goats

**4-H & FFA Large Animal Round Robin Contest:** The Large Animal Round Robin Contest will be on the Sunday of fair at 8:30am in the Beef Arena-Lower Level. The Grand Champion Fitting & Showing Showman winner from 4-H and FFA from each large animal livestock species (beef, dairy cow, swine, sheep, horse, & large/Dairy goats) will compete in the Large Animal Round Robin. The Superintendents will choose the animals to be used in the Round Robin. Each contestant will show each species of livestock: Beef, Sheep, Swine, Dairy Cow, Horse, & Large Goat. All contestants will be assigned a number for identification by the superintendent for the Judge to identify you with. Contestants will be scored on their ability to show each of the livestock species and their knowledge of those animals. They will be scored on a scale of 1- (low ability) to 10- (outstanding ability). The contestant with the top score will be the winner. In the case of a tie, judge & superintendents will conference and immediately break the tie .

**BEEF CARCASS CONTEST:** All Animals must have been judged in the Market Steer class at the fair. All beef carcasses that are available to be judged will be evaluated according to carcass evaluation criteria set forth by WSU Extension. A belt buckle will be awarded to the Top Overall Beef Carcass. Check with Extension office to see if this will be offered in [2025](#).

## **Livestock Judging Contest:**

All contestants compete on an individual basis. Each contestant shall place, according to his judgement, classes of beef, swine, goats, and sheep. If there are more cattle entered than there is pen space, the Beef Superintendent will have the right to impose a limit on the number of exhibits shown per exhibitor. Exhibitors will be notified of said limitation at least one week prior to the fair. Dairy cattle must have been owned and cared for by exhibitor since the first Saturday of December. Breeding certificates must be on file at the Extension Office 90 days prior to the fair. Each exhibitor will be allowed a total of two entries/premiums in this class, provided they are from two different classes. A breeding herd cow must be owned by the exhibitor for at least one year prior to April fair and exhibitor must have records displayed showing sire, dam, breeder, and average daily rate of milk production.

Only de-horned or naturally polled market steers will be eligible to show. Any steers having horns over two inches long-from the skin at the base of the horn to the tip, will be disqualified. Straight-bred dairy steers, stags and cryptorchids are not eligible.

An exhibitor may exhibit only one market steer in Division 101 & 112. Steers must have been owned and cared for by the exhibitor since the first Saturday of December. Steers will be awarded ribbons for quality as follows: Choice = Blue, Select = Red, Standard or Below = White. Minimum weight is 1100 lbs. with no maximum weight. Steers are to be divided into classes by weight by the Beef Superintendent. Classes should not exceed 10 steers per class. All steers must be officially tagged. A belt buckle and rosette will be given to the Grand Champion and a trophy or rosette will be given to the Reserve Champion in market class.

### **4-H & FFA Swine:** Pre-entry is required in all classes. Points allowed: Blue–100, Red–75, White – 50

Swine hair length: Market swine exhibited at the Asotin County Fair must have at least ½ inch of hair. Any swine in question will be measured. Measurements will be done by the swine superintendent and or fairboard.

Measurements will be taken at three designated points of the swine. The three points to be measured are: on top of the pig at the ham/loin junction, along the side of the pig, and the mid side of area of the ham. Measuring device will have a line at half (½) inch and hair found to be lower than that line will be deemed too short. Exhibitors with too short of swine hair will be so designated before entering the show ring for clerical purposes. Any exhibitor found to have a hog with hair shorter than half (1/2) of an inch will be penalized by being dropped down one ribbon placing in both showmanship and quality classes. (Example: a purple ribbon or call back would receive a blue ribbon, a blue ribbon would receive a red ribbon and a red ribbon will receive a white ribbon.) Shaving of the tail and ears is permitted. Oil or Powder is not allowed on swine, this will be strictly enforced. Only cordless clippers will be allowed in the barns. Only barrows and gilts are eligible; any hog showing evidence of pigginess, scars, hernia, sores, bruises, cryptorchidism, or any blemishes that impair the value of the carcass will be disqualified. Market hogs must have been owned and cared for by the exhibitor since the fourth Saturday of January or first swine tagging/weigh-in. Market hogs must be officially tagged. The minimum weight will be 230lbs at the official weigh-in on Thursday of fair week. The maximum weight will be 300 pounds, the maximum payout weight at the livestock auction will be 290 lbs. As an example, a 297-lb pig would sell at 290-lbs through the livestock auction. Market hogs not meeting these weight requirements will be shown in underweight or the overweight classes. A belt buckle and rosette will be awarded to the Grand Champion and a trophy and rosette will be awarded to the Reserve Champion in Class 01. Swine exceeding 300-lbs and shown in the overweight class will no longer be qualified to sell in the auction and are not eligible to compete for champion or reserve champion market swine.

Market lambs must have been born after July 1, weigh at least 110 lbs. at the official fair weigh-in and must be owned and cared for by the exhibitor by the third Saturday of February. All market lambs must be officially tagged. Only wether and ewe lambs are eligible; ram lambs and cryptorchids will be disqualified. A belt buckle and rosette will be awarded to the Grand Champion and a trophy and rosette will be awarded to the Reserve Champion in Division 130-Class 01.

Q-Fever is a bacterial organism commonly shed by sheep, goats, and cattle. Sheep and goats in the last 14 days of pregnancy, and female sheep and goat up to 14 days postpartum are most likely to be shedding this organism. This disease is communicable to humans. Female goats and sheep within the last 14 days of pregnancy, and 14 days following the birth of live or dead lambs/kids are not allowed to be exhibited at the Asotin County Fair.

## 4-H & FFA LARGE ANIMAL EXHIBIT DEPARTMENT GOATS

**Goats:** An inspection will take place at the fairgrounds when your animal arrives. See general veterinarian information. The Asotin County Fair requires all goats to have official USDA National Scrapie Eradication program-assigned flock identification available during vet check-in. This may include either a tag, tattoo, or microchip (with reader provided by exhibitor). Superintendents and Veterinarians will not allow unmarked animals through the vet check.

**Pre-entry required for all 4-H and FFA classes.**

All tack, feed, etc. must be stored within your club's assigned area.

Q-Fever is a bacterial organism commonly shed by sheep, goats, and cattle. Goats in the last 14-days of pregnancy, and female goats up to 14-days postpartum are most likely to be shedding the organism. This disease is communicable to humans. Female goats within the last 14-days of pregnancy, and 14-days following the birth of live or dead kids are not allowed to be entered or exhibited at the Asotin County Fair.

**4H & FFA Goats:** Pre-entry is required in all classes.

Points allowed: Blue – 100, Red – 75, White – 50

### **Market Goats**

1. Market goats must be less than one year of age and weigh a minimum of 70 pounds to be eligible for the auction at fair.
2. Market goats must be owned and cared for by the exhibitor by the third Saturday in February.
3. Only wethers and does are eligible to be shown. No bucks or cryptorchids.
4. Horns will be allowed on market/meat goats, **BUT they Must be Covered.**
5. Show attire: Black or dark color jeans, long sleeve button-up shirt, belt, boots or other hard closed toe shoes.
6. Goats **may NOT** be cross entered into different types/quality goat classes. Each goat is entered in one type/quality class.



## **Goats Continued:**

### **Fitting & Showmanship and Type/Quality Contest**

1. In fitting & showmanship, the emphasis is on the knowledge and performance of the 4-H or FFA member. In type/quality judging the emphasis is on the condition, conformation and characteristics of the animal. We are most concerned with the personal development of the 4-H and FFA members. Therefore, all fitting & showing contest have the same premium points (blue-100, red-75, and white-50) regardless of the type/quality, size, training or value of the animal involved.
2. All exhibitors must complete a fitting and showmanship class in order to receive premiums and/or ribbons in their animal section. Fitting and showmanship classes are concluded with the selection of champion and reserve champions exhibitors.
3. All animals used for fitting and showmanship must also be entered in type/quality competition. In order for fitting and showmanship premiums to be assigned, exhibitors must also show their own animal in type/quality class except when given permission by the goat superintendent to substitute another exhibitor-handler. (Example: when two or more animals are being exhibited by the same exhibitor in the same show ring.) Exhibitors are only allowed to sale one market animal.
4. All goats must be owned and cared for by the exhibitors by the first Saturday of December.
5. In general, Exhibitors clothing should be clean and in good shape (no holes, tears, or wrinkles). Hair should be neat. Long hair should be pulled back so it does not cover your face. No rings, necklaces, dangling earrings, watches or bracelets. Potentially offensive statements on clothing will not be permitted. In general, the following items are not permitted when showing: hats, cell phones and other electronic devices, and gum chewing. Accommodations may be accepted upon request. Adaptations for religious reasons will be permitted. Please notify the Fair Board prior to the fair.
6. The Overall Grand Champion Fitting and Showing Showman winner from 4-H and FFA from combined divisions 104B (Nigerian Dwarf) & 104C (Pygmy), will compete in the Small Animal Round Robin. Exceptions to this rule could occur if the superintendent feels there are not enough FFA members entered, they then will be combined with the 4-H Senior class and the Overall Grand and Overall Reserve will compete in the Small Animal Round Robin.
7. The Overall Grand Champion Fitting & Showing Showman winner from 4-H and FFA from combined divisions 104D (market/meat), 104E (dairy), 104F (pack), & 104G (fiber) will compete in the Large Animal Round Robin. Exceptions to this rule could occur if the superintendent feels there are not enough FFA members entered, they than will be combined with the 4-H senior class and the Overall Grand and Overall Reserve Champion will compete in the Large Animal Round Robin.

**Goat Costume Contest:** The Costume award is at the judges' discretion. Evaluation will be based on the creativity and originality of both the exhibitor and the goat.

Competition will be on a club or chapter basis. Judges will examine the livestock exhibits at least once daily. Their score will be totaled and averaged. The exhibits will be judged on Friday and Saturday from 9:00am – 6:00pm and Sunday from 9:00am – 2:00pm. Scores will be posted daily at a designated location in each barn. Final awards will be based on total of daily scores of each division and will be awarded Sunday afternoon. In addition to each club or chapter's exhibit area, each club/chapter will be given a designated area of the barn (e.g., wash rack, show arena, barn entrance, etc.) by the barn superintendent which must be kept neat and clean. These designated areas are also judged.

10. The Costume Contest Award is at the Judge's Discretion. Evaluation will be based on the creativity and originality of both exhibitor and cat. A picture Plaque and rosette ribbon will be awarded to the Top Overall Costume Champion and a rosette ribbon to the Reserve Champion.

5. Handlers must be neatly groomed & appropriately dressed. For proper dress attire refer to WSU 4-H Dog Project showmanship guide.
6. In the case of a tie, there will be a runoff. A Top of Class ribbon may be awarded in each class. A special award in each age group may be awarded for the highest score in showmanship and highest score in obedience. A Best Showman Award in each age group may be given for the highest combined scores of Showmanship and Obedience. These awards are given at the judges' discretion. Point scale for ribbon placing to be posted. A trophy will be offered in each age group within a class, with an Overall Showmanship Award for 4-H. A trophy and rosette will be awarded to the Top Overall in Showmanship and a trophy and rosette to the Top Showman and Rosette to the Reserve in each age division.
7. A member may show one dog for Showmanship, and another do for Obedience. Handlers are responsible for completing their Asotin County 4-H Agility Release Form. Handlers need to present their completed release form to the Dog Superintendent before they can participate in agility trials. **4-H & FFA Equine Rules:**

- A. There is no riding of horses on any paved road, the walking ramp to upper level is for pedestrians only. No Livestock animals allowed on the ramp please. Please walk beside your animal, all horses must be led to the upper level for safety reasons. The warm-up arena is the riding area around the horse barn or arena itself. Remember: SAFETY FIRST!
- B. Please clean up your area on the upper and lower parking lots. Do not leave hay or manure laying around. To protect the storm water drainage there will be no feeding of hay outside of trailers on the upper parking lot.
- C. No horses allowed in the grass areas on the upper level. Horses may be tied to the hitching posts or in the horse area. There are limited stalls available in the horse barn, these must be reserved with the horse superintendent. The rodeo stock pens are available during the horse show only to hold horses while not in use for the show.

- 1. This horse show will be conducted in accordance with the PNW 4-H Horse Contest Guide.
- 2. Asotin County 4-H Horse projects are encouraged to use the 4-H Horse project publication known as PNW 587.
- 3. To show a horse at the Asotin County Fair, 4-H member must file a horse certificate with the Asotin County Extension Office 90 days prior to the 4-H/FFA Horse Show.
- 4. A current photo of the horse must be attached to the horse certificate.
- 5. Regardless of the number of certificates filed, only two horses may be used for the 4-H/FFA Horse Show.
- 6. For the horse show, only 2 horses are allowed per youth; ONE horse may be used for all performance divisions and ONE horse may be used for all Western classes.
- 7. Games divisions. Exhibitors may not cross divisions with either horse. Each horse must be shown in Showmanship under the division in which it is entered.
- 8. Asotin County 4-H Horse Show enforces the Pacific Northwest 4-H Horse Contest Guide rules regarding members only riding the project horse 90 days prior to showing at the Asotin County Fair. Care, control, and training should fall to the project owner exclusively during the 90-day window before fair. A request of variance to the 90-day ruling must be made in writing and presented to the Horse Leaders' Council for approval 90 days or more prior to the fair. NO recreational use by non-project members will be permitted in that 90-day window before the fair.
- 9. To show at the Asotin County Fair, a member must have attended club meetings.
- 10. If a 4-H/FFA members' horse cannot be used due to death, severe injury or disease, the member must have a statement from a veterinarian and the 4-H members leader explaining why. The Horse Leaders Council will review the statement and approve the use of a substitute horse. The member may show at the county level but will not qualify to exhibit at the state fair.
- 11. All riders must be dressed appropriately as stated in the PNW 4-H Horse Contest Guide.
- 12. All tack and equipment must meet the requirements stated in the PNW 4-H Horse Contest Guide.
- 13. 4-H Equestrian headgear must follow PNW 4-H Horse Contest Guide descriptions.

13. Equipment check will be prior to each class. This will include helmets. Equipment checks will be made by the designated person by the Horse Leaders' committee.
14. DRUGGING: Asotin County Horse Show enforces the PNW 4-H Horse Contest Guide rules concerning this practice.

Seniors & FFA show first; intermediates next; juniors last. The horse should do what the rider asks with the least possible effort on the part of the rider and least amount of resistance from the horse. The member will be judged on correct posture, smooth gait transitions and effective use of aids, with special emphasis on light hands. The performance of the horse is not to be considered more important than the methods used by the rider in obtaining the performance. All classes will be held in accordance with the PNW 4-H Horse Contest Guide.

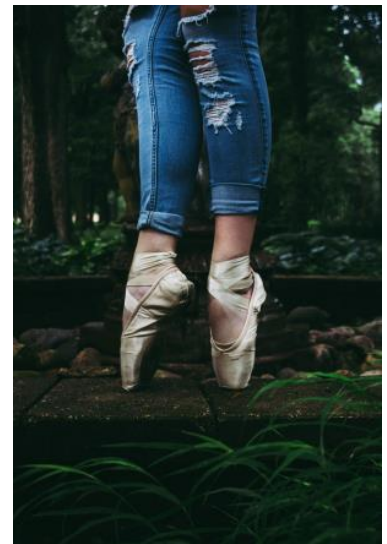
