4-H Handbook 2024

2024 EXHIBIT & PROJECT ENTRY INFORMATION

- 1. Anyone entering any article/project in the Asotin County Fair must complete an entry form.
- 2. Entries for 4-H & FFA Projects must be pre-entered at: www.asotincountyfair.fairentry.com
- 3. Open Class entries will be done on entry forms handed out at time of exhibit entry. Please print legibly or use **mailing address** labels. Please complete entry form entirely with the department (example flowers), Age Division, Division Number & Class Number.
- 4. Each exhibit entry must be entered separately.
- 5. All entries must be picked up on the Monday after Fair from 3:00pm-7:00pm. Any exhibits left after 7:00pm om Monday are left at the owner's own risk. If you are unable to pick up your entry on the Monday after the fair, please contact Peggy Hansford 208-791-1451.
- 6. Exhibitor Premium checks will be mailed out in June. If entry forms are not legible and able to read, the Asotin County Fair Board is not responsible for delivery of premium checks. All entry forms must have a first name, last name, and **complete** mailing address.
- 7. Each Department has a number of entry limits allowed by each exhibitor.
- 8. Fair Superintendents and Fair Board members reserve the right to reject any entries brought in to exhibit.
- 9. Still life & Livestock entry problems that arise concerning any entry in the fair are to be brought before the livestock superintendent or hall superintendent in their area entered. If the problem cannot be resolved at that level, the superintendent over that department will contact the Fair Board President, the Fair Board President will then bring the issue to the board members to resolve.
- 10. Any use of alcohol or drugs or being found under the influence of drugs or alcohol while on the Asotin County Fairgrounds by an exhibitor will result in automatic dismissal from the Fairgrounds. The person will be turned over to the proper authorities and parents of underage exhibitors will be notified to remove any animals or entries from the fairgrounds. Youth exhibitors Will NOT BE allowed to sell their animals at the Livestock Sale.

MARKET LIVESTOCK SALE

4-H and FFA exhibitors of market livestock are entitled to sell ONE large market animal through the Asotin County Fair 4-H & FFA Livestock Auction Sale on Saturday at 4:30 PM. To be eligible for the sale, all animals must have been weighed/tagged at the official weigh-in. Each Exhibitor MUST be present with their animal at the sale. Exceptions only with Fair Board's authorization.

Final Weigh-in Market Steers 4/27/2024 Minimum Weight 1,100 pounds

Final Weigh-in Market Swine 4/27/2024 Minimum Weight 230 pounds, Maximum Weight 300 pounds-(Payout to 290 pounds)

Final Weigh-in Market Lambs 4/27/2024 Minimum weight 110 pounds

Final Weigh-in Market Goats 4/27/2024 Minimum weight 70 pounds

STATE BRAND REGULATION A certificate of permit for hauling cattle must be made out before leaving home. Cattle with the brand of the previous owner must also have a bill of sale signed by the previous owner. The certificates of permit and bills of sale will be given to the weigh master at the scales at the final weigh in.

ASOTIN COUNTY FAIR 4-H and FFA MARKET LIVESTOCK SALE RULES

1. Currently enrolled Asotin County 4-H or FFA members may exhibit ONE market animal. The exhibitor must bring only one animal to

the Official Fair Weigh-in on Thursday of fair week. An exhibitor may exhibit a second animal in breeding classes. Species limitation does not include rabbits, poultry, or horses. If animal is not a tagged market animal, it will not be weighed.

- 2. Scales will remain open to exhibitors until 6pm Wednesday of fair week, and re-open at 12pm Thursday for Official Fair Weigh-in.
- 3. NO market animals will be stalled prior to Official Fair Weigh-in.
- 4. A WSU Health Record Form (Quality Assurance Form) must be submitted (signed and properly completed) by all 4-H and FFA market beef, market goat, market sheep and market swine exhibitors at the time that they weigh in their animal on Thursday afternoon. Individuals that do not have a completed Health Record Form will not be able to sell their animal through the livestock auction. The Official Fair (FINAL) Weigh-in will be between 12:00 and 6:00 PM on Thursday of fair week.
- 5. Scale weight, if not disputed, will be final. If disputed, a chance for re-weigh will be done immediately. The animal will be removed from the scale, the scale will be balanced, and the animal will be re-weighed.
- 6. A slip with exhibitor's name and animal's weight will be available at the scales.
- 7. Sales committee is responsible for: Securing support price, Auctioneers, securing trucking, Bookkeeping, Clerking, Photographs, Sales accounts, Proof-reading sale order, withholding trucking fees when needed, Supervising and handling and loading of sale animals Sunday at 4:30 PM. 4PM IS THE OFFICIAL CLOSE OF THE FAIR. No Vehicles are allowed on the grounds to load out supplies. Exhibitors are responsible for their projects up until 4 PM. Cleaning of pens is not to be done until Monday after fair at 5:00pm, NO EXCEPTIONS. Although animals will be marked the sales committee will do their best to start loading from the FFA area. All exhibitors must be out of barns by 4:00pm Sunday, with load-out of animals immediately following. Leave stall cards in place.
- 8. 1% will be withheld from sale animals for casualty fund. All exhibitors are strongly urged to purchase livestock liability insurance for their animals. Market value will be determined by the auction support price for goats, sheep, hogs, and beef. Rabbits and chickens will not be included as there is no support price offered at the auction. In case of buyer's default of payment for livestock purchased or individual participant support at the sale, funds may be transferred from the casualty fund to recover the loss, upon removal of the sales committee after Official Weigh-In is complete.
- 9. Brand Inspection: Actual cost per head for Brand Inspection will be responsibility of seller of market steers. (See "State Brand Regulation" paragraph above.)
- 10. Sale animal hauling fee will be held from exhibitor's checks when required.
- 11. Terms of Sale: Cash-terms 30 days, 1% pencil shrink on lambs, 3% pencil shrink on steers. No shrink on hogs
- 12. Sale order will be made from live placing of animals by barn superintendents and with cooperation of Extension office; and be submitted to the sales committee on Friday immediately following completion of all the market classes.
- 13. The fair board, has final say on all animals that go through the sale with the input of the Sales Committee & Superintendents. The president of the Sales Committee has final say on any changes in sale order. The Sales Committee has the right to refuse any bid.
- 14. No deformed, injured or cryptorchid animals will be sold. A licensed veterinarian will give his signed decision on paper.
- 15. Support price bids deadline is 1:00 PM on Saturday, bids to be opened at sales office. Bidders welcome at bid opening.
- 16. Animals will be sold in the following order: rabbits, chickens, goats, sheep, beef, and hogs., unless changed by the Sales Committee.
- 17. Barn Superintendents will be responsible for getting animals in sale ring.
- 18. All halters and safety chains (neck ropes) are to be left on steers until they are loaded out
- 19. Loading will be done by the Sales Committee, the barn superintendents, and their designated help at 4:30 PM. Loading out is not to begin before 4:30pm.
- 20. Beef project owners MUST have a hauling slip and a Bill of Sale before the animal goes on the scale at final weigh-in.
- 21. Animals exceeding maximum weight at first weigh-in will not be tagged
- 22. Animals sold at the Market Sale will be held on the Fairgrounds until close of Fair on Sunday. The seller/exhibitor will be financially responsible for the animal and its care until 4pm Sunday of Fair.
- 23. ONLY OFFICIALLY TAGGED ANIMALS WILL BE ALLOWED TO PARTICIPATE IN THE MARKET SALE. Animals exceeding maximum

weight at first weigh-in will not be tagged or be able to sell at the livestock auction.

- 24. All market livestock will be weighed and tagged on their respective dates as follows:
- **8am-9:30am-12/2/2023 Market steers (3 maximum) will be weighed and tagged with an official ear tag in the right ear on the first Saturday of December. Maximum weight at first weigh-in is 1000 pounds.*
- **8am-11am-1/27/2024 Market hogs (3 maximum) will be weighed/tagged with an official ear tag in the right ear on or before the fourth Saturday of January. Maximum weight at first weigh-in is 150 pounds.
- **8am-11am 2/24/2024 Market lambs and goats (3 maximum) will be weighed and tagged with an official ear tag in the right ear on the fourth Saturday. Maximum weight at first weigh-in is 110 pounds for lambs. Goat maximum weight at first weigh-in is 80 pounds.
- **Animal weights that exceed maximum weight limits at first weigh-in will not be tagged and will not be weighed at final weigh-in.
- 25. All market animals not making minimum weight requirements at the Official Final Weigh-in at the fair on Thursday will be re-tagged in the left ear at that time.

HEALTH REQUIREMENTS: Q-Fever is a bacterial organism commonly shed by sheep, goats, and cattle. Goats and sheep in the last 14 days of pregnancy, and female goat and sheep are most likely to be shedding this organism. This disease is communicable to humans. Female goats and sheep within the last 14 days of pregnancy, and 14 days following the birth of live or dead lambs/kids are not allowed to be exhibited at the Asotin County Fair.

- 1. Washington livestock requires no vaccinations or tests for entry into the Asotin County Fair.
- 2. Weigh in veterinarians (chosen by the Fairboard) may inspect all classes of livestock and poultry (including horses, pet animals, fur-bearing animals, pigeons, ducks, geese, and turkeys), before they are exhibited, to determine that the livestock and poultry are free from infectious or contagious disease and ectoparasites.
- 3. Weigh in veterinarians WILL reject any animals with infectious or contagious disease or ectoparasites. Exhibitors should be aware that RINGWORM, WARTS, PINKEYE, STRANGLES, CONTAGIOUS ECTHYMA, SCABIES, LICE, MITES, TICKS, AND FLEAS fall into these categories.
- 4. No animals from a quarantined area/premise will be permitted to enter the fair.
- 5. ALL OUT-OF-STATE ENTRIES must comply with the State of Washington import regulations. A health certificate must be issued by an accredited veterinarian from the state of origin for all out of state livestock and poultry entries.
- 6. Only upon a veterinarian's and a barn superintendent's approval shall tranquilizers, antibiotics, etc., be used or administered by a vet on market animals.
- 7. The Asotin County Fair requires all female sheep and goats and all intact male sheep and goats to have official USDA National Scrapie Eradication program-assigned flock identification available during vet check-in. This may include either a tag, tattoo, or microchip (with reader provided by exhibitor). Veterinarians will not allow unmarked animals through vet check.
- 8. All open class, 4-H and FFA goats shall not have any horns. This includes all breeds. No goat with horns will be allowed to show at the Asotin County Fair. Horns must be removed before the fair.

4-H & FFA EXHIBIT GENERAL RULES & REGULATIONS

4-H Shows First in Even Years, followed by FFA, FFA Show First in Odd Years, followed by 4-H

- 1. All exhibitors must abide by the 4-H & General rules for each department in which they exhibit.
- 2. 4-H and FFA animal exhibits and other projects, must be pre-entered online at https://asotincountyfair.fairentry.com
- 3. All 4-H/FFA Exhibits must be pre-entered By April 5th,2024. Exhibits must be entered using department, division and class listed in this exhibitor handbook. Exhibitors are responsible for correctly completing entry forms. It is required for all 4-H/FFA exhibitors to pre-enter using https://asotincountyfair.fairentry.com.
- 4. Exhibitors are limited to one entry per class unless otherwise specified.
- 5. Entry tags will be furnished. Incomplete tags will force disqualification of exhibit. Exhibitors age division will be noted on every tag. Age divisions are determined as of October 1st of current year. Cloverbuds are 5 to 7 years of age; Juniors are 8 to 10 years of age; Intermediates are 11 to 13 years of age; Seniors are 14 to less than 19 years of age.
- 6. Cloverbud members are limited in the amount of entries per department. Cloverbuds will receive a participation ribbon and are NOT eligible for any trophies or special awards. Cloverbuds will NOT be evaluated in a competitive fashion. Their role is for participation only. Refer to Extension Publication EM 4840 for further details.
- 7. Residents of Asotin County, and/or youth attending Asotin County schools or those who are enrolled in Asotin or Clarkston FFA or Asotin 4-H, are eligible to compete in the Asotin County Fair. A non-resident who is enrolled in Asotin County 4-H and complies with project guidelines is eligible to compete in the Asotin County Fair. All others may compete in Open Class Events.
- 8. 4-H members MUST be enrolled in the projects they are exhibiting by November 1st of the program year. Those 4-H Members that did not get enrolled by the deadline, must come to the fairboard and ask permission to show at the fair, the exhibitor must provide the reason for not getting signed up in time.
- 9. All exhibits must have been made since the previous year's Asotin County Fair. 4-H exhibits MUST NOT have been made as a school project. School projects may be entered as open class. Exceptions will be made if the exhibit was made as an Asotin County 4-H School Enrichment program.
- 10. Exhibits are placed on exhibit at the owner's risk. Supervision during public hours is provided. The Asotin County Fair and its volunteers are not responsible for theft or damages to exhibits.
- 11. All exhibits will be evaluated using the Danish System, according to merit. Awards (blue, red & white) will only be given to exhibits of merit. The Danish System of evaluation is based upon established standards of quality for each type of product. In this system, each exhibit is evaluated according to how well it meets the standard rather than how well it compares with other exhibits. It does not compare one person's work to another. The evaluation is made against a project standard. The judge evaluates whether the requirements have been met. Stickers ribbons are awarded according to the degree that the member's project meets those standards. A participation ribbon may be awarded to an exhibitor whose work fulfills the minimum qualifications.
- 12. Exhibits should be picked up from 3:00pm to 7:00pm the Monday following fair. For exhibits left after 7:00pm on Monday, exhibitors will need to contact Peggy Hansford at hansfordpeggy@yahoo.com, or 208-791-1451.
- 13. Any exhibits removed before 3:00pm on Monday will forfeit their premium money and awards.
- 14. 4-H and FFA groups have been assigned areas for Fairground cleanup. Groups MUST do pre-fair and post fair cleanup in their assigned areas. Pen areas that are not cleaned by the second Sunday after fair will be charged a fee of \$20 per pen. All premium checks will be withheld for the entire club or group until the fee is paid.
- 15. ALL Adults are prohibited from preparation of livestock and the cleaning of stalls or pens at the fair for their children or club members. These activities ARE the responsibility of the exhibitors. Other Asotin County 4-H & FFA exhibitors may help each other (but may not do all the work) while preparing their exhibit. Exceptions can be made for Fair Royalty if they are attending other fair related responsibilities. Arrangements must be made with the barn superintendent in advance for this exception.
- 16. All exhibitors must dress tastefully and conservatively. Bare feet and exposed midriffs are not allowed. All shirts must have at least three finger width straps at the shoulders, No Tank Tops, mesh or see through (sheer) clothing is allowed for showing. Undergarments may not be exposed. Clothing that advertises tobacco, drugs, alcohol, gang affiliation, sexually explicit messages or obscenities will not be allowed. All clothing and shoes must be clean and in good repair. Exhibitors will not participate in the Asotin County Fair unless they acknowledge and comply with this dress code. If, in the opinion of the activity or event officials, an exhibitor does not comply, that exhibitor shall be given one opportunity to correct the problem. If the exhibitor fails to correct the issue, they will be asked to leave the activity or event and forfeit all awards and premiums.

Official FFA Dess: FFA Jacket - zipped to the top, Official FFA Scarf/Tie, White button-up shirt with collar (not a polo!), Jean Pants & Dark Colored Belt, & Non-tennis shoes (preferably boots or work boots)

17. Superintendents are responsible for disqualifying any unsatisfactory exhibits.

- 18. 4-H & FFA ANIMAL RULES: Any large animal exhibit at the Asotin County Fair may be used in a livestock judging event. The exhibitor will have their animal ready to show at the request of the barn superintendent. The Asotin County Fair Board, Asotin County 4-H Leaders, and Asotin and Clarkston FFA Chapters are not liable for any accident or injury that may occur while an animal is on exhibit. If an exhibitor refuses to have their animal in the event, they will be disqualified from the show and forfeit any premium money or awards.
- A. All livestock exhibitors will have proof of ownership and certificate.
- B. All livestock Exhibitors must compete in Showmanship and Market Quality classes. Exhibitors who do not show their own animal will not receive credit/premiums or awards for all classes entered. NO EXCEPTIONS unless Brought before the Fairboard Prior to fair.
- C. Showmanship will be held in accordance with Extension Publication EM 1982: General Rules for Junior Livestock Shows.
- D. Exhibitors are expected to furnish their own hay, grain, water pails and feed troughs.
- E. All animals must remain on exhibit until 4:00pm on Sunday of fair and will be fed and watered during this time. Failure to care for animals will result in forfeiture of premium money and a \$100.00 fine. 4-H members will also be subject to disciplinary action of the 4-H Livestock Leader's Council.
- F. Animal Health and the use of illegal substances: The use of illegal drugs and/or improper use of animal health products, or foreign substances is not tolerated in the Washington State 4-H Youth Development Program or at the Asotin County Fair. Extension personnel, 4-H Volunteers, and Fair Volunteers have the responsibility to report any illegal substance or misuse of any drug or medication. Additionally, there are Federal penalties for using illegal substances in animals that are entering the nation's food supply. The Asotin County Fairboard has adopted this policy for all animal exhibitors.
- G. Asotin County Fair, 4-H & FFA will adhere to the National Show Ring Code of Ethics.
- I. Mistreatment of animals while on the fairgrounds, improper handling, unsanitary conditions, or lack of proper nutrition will constitute immediate removal from the fairgrounds. Review of such action will be brought before a committee of fair superintendents, and fairboard. The judgement of the committee will be final.
- J. Any animal considered unsafe will come before a committee of fair superintendents, and fairboard for review and possible dismissal from the grounds. The judgement of the committee will be final.
- K. An Asotin County Fair stall card will be provided for each animal exhibit. Stall cards MUST be completed and displayed above or near each exhibit no later than 9:00am Friday morning of fair. Animals will not be allowed to be shown unless this is completed. Stall cards must be left up until the Monday after fair.
- L. No Tack removal from the barns on Sunday after fair Closes. Everyone must be out of the barns by 4:00 PM on Sunday to facilitate ease of animal load out. Remember: at close of fair on Sunday there is no cleaning of the stalls until Monday after fair. Please leave stall cards in place!
- M. Cleaning may begin at 5:00pm on the Monday after fair and must be completed by the second Sunday after the fair.
- N. Cleaning of all pens must be checked off by a Fair Board member.

4-H & FFA equine rules:

- A. There is no riding of horses on any paved road, the walking ramp to upper level is for pedestrians only. No Livestock animals allowed on the ramp please. Please walk beside your animal, all horse must be led to the upper level for safety reasons. The warm-up arena is the riding area around the horse barn or arena itself. Remember: SAFETY FIRST!
- B. Please clean up your area on the upper and lower parking lots. Do not leave hay or manure laying around. To protect the storm water drainage there will be no feeding of hay outside of trailers on the upper parking lot.
- C. No horses allowed in the grass areas on the upper level. Horses may be tied to the hitching posts or in the horse area. There are limited stalls available in the horse barn, these must be reserved with the horse superintendent. The rodeo stock pens are available during the horse show only to hold horses while not in use for the show.

Dress Code

All exhibitors must be appropriately dressed when: showing their animal, during livestock judging classes, or selling their animal. **The following dress code WILL be strictly enforced:** Jeans or Slacks with a LONG sleeve shirt or blouse that is tucked in, and if in FFA their jacket & tie. Shirts and Blouses are to be buttoned to within 1 button from the top. Boots are HIGHLY recommended, but clean, heavy athletic shoes that are laced to the top and tied or a similar leather shoe can be substituted. All clothing should be clean and in good repair. Jewelry is discouraged due to safety hazards.

NO hats are to be worn while showing, No exceptions. Premium money will be withheld.

4-H & FFA LARGE ANIMAL EXHIBIT DEPARTMENT Beef, Swine, Sheep, & Goats

<u>Pre-entry Required for all Livestock Classes</u>, Enter Market Animals Thursday April 25th, 2024, from 12pm-6pm, Line up in main parking lot. Breeding and open Class Livestock check in with the barn superintendent.

4-H & FFA Large Animal Herdsmanship Contest: The purpose of the herdsmanship contest is to encourage exhibitors to care for livestock, pens, and equipment properly to always keep stalls and animals clean and attractive. Competition will be on a club or chapter basis. Herdsmanship judges will examine each club/chapters livestock exhibits at least once daily. Their score will be totaled and averaged. The exhibits will be judged on Friday and Saturday from 9am – 6pm and Sunday from 9am – 2pm. Scores will be posted daily at a designated location in each barn. Final awards will be based on total of daily scores of each division and will be awarded at the Sunday afternoon. In addition to each club or chapter's exhibit area, each club/chapter will be designated an area of the barn (e.g., wash rack, show arena, barn entrance, etc.) by the barn superintendent which must be kept neat and clean. These designated areas are also judged.

- 1. Animals 35 points Arrangements, tying, cleanliness and grooming, bedding clean, regularity of feeding and watering.
- 2. Stalls/Pens and Walkways 35 points Orderliness of equipment and supplies, neatness, and cleanliness of designated area during fair and post fair.
- 3. Educational Information 10 points Posters and stall cards are legible and completed. 4-H or FFA Identification to be scored and judged one time only
- 4. Exhibitors 20 points Appearance, attitude, courtesy, skill, and interaction with the public.

NOTE: Herdmanship Work TO BE DONE BY EXHIBITORS! Adult help is prohibited. Violation will result in forfeit of premium money.

4-H & FFA Large Animal Gain Contest: All sale animals must be weighed and or tagged at the Official First Weigh-In:

- 1. Steers, on the first Saturday of December,
- 2. Lambs & Goats, the on the Fourth Saturday of February or a date which makes the days on feed closest to 60-days for lambs & goats.

3. Swine on the last Saturday of January.

The Official Final Weigh-in will be on the Thursday of fair week, from 12:00 – 6:00 PM. The final placing will be determined on the average daily gain (total pounds of gain divided by days on feed.) To qualify for an award, animals must meet the following weight requirements: Steers: 1100 lbs. minimum weight, Sheep: 110 minimum weight, Swine 230lbs minimum weight, Goats: 70lbs minimum weight.

4-H & FFA Large Animal Round Robin Contest: Large Animal Round Robin will be on the Sunday of fair at 8:30am in the Beef Arena-Lower Level. The Grand Champion Fitting & Showing Showman winner from 4-H and FFA from each large animal livestock species (beef, dairy cow, swine, sheep, horse, & goat) will compete in the Large Animal Round Robin. The Superintendents will choose the animals to be used in the Round Robin. Each contestant will show each species of livestock: Beef, Sheep, Swine, Diary Cow, Goat, & Horse. All contestants will be assigned a number for identification by the superintendent for the Judge to identify you with. Contestants will be scored on their ability to show each of the livestock species and their knowledge of those animals. They will be scored on a scale of 1- (low ability) to 10- (outstanding ability). The contestant with the top score will be the winner. In the case of a tie, judges will conference and immediately break the tie.

BEEF CARCASS CONTEST: All Animals must have been judged in the Market Steer class at the fair. All beef carcasses that are available to be judged will be evaluated according to carcass evaluation criteria set forth by WSU Extension. A belt buckle will be awarded to the Top Overall Beef Carcass.

FITTING & SHOWING: Points allowed: Blue – 100, Red – 75, White – 50

All 4-H and FFA members carrying livestock projects MUST enter this contest. Past winners are not excluded.

The purpose of the livestock showmanship contest is to create more interest and better knowledge of fitting, training, handling, and showing livestock. Breed, type, and conformation is not considered. The exhibitor must do all training and preparation of the animal prior to and during the show. Each exhibitor MUST show their own animal. A trophy or rosette will be given to the Grand Champion Showman and a rosette will be given to the Reserve Champion Showman in each 4-H and FFA Fitting & showing Division. Top overall 4-H and FFA Showman will receive a belt buckle and rosette and will compete in the Large Animal Round Robin contest for Top Overall Showman. 4-H shows first in even years followed by FFA. FFA shows first in odd years followed by 4-H.

On Saturday morning of fair, Swine showmanship will begin at 8:00am.

Sheep followed by Goat showmanship will start at 9:00am.

Beef showmanship will begin at 11:00am.

The Large Animal Round Robin showmanship contest will begin on Sunday at 8:30 AM

Swine hair length: Market swine exhibited at the Asotin County Fair must have at least ½ inch of hair. Any swine in question will be measured. Measurements will be done by the swine superintendent and or fairboard. Measurements will be taken at three designated points of the swine. The three points to be measured are: on top if the pig at the ham/loin junction, along the side of the pig, and the mid side of area of the ham. Measuring device will have a line at half (½) inch and hair found to be lower than that line will be deemed too short. Exhibitors with too short of swine hair will be so designated before entering the show ring for clerical purposes. Any exhibitor found to have a hog with hair shorter than half (1/2) of an inch will be penalized by being dropped down one ribbon placing in both showmanship and quality classes. (Example: a purple ribbon or call back would receive a blue ribbon, a blue ribbon would receive a red ribbon and a red ribbon will receive a white ribbon.) Shaving of the tail and ears is permitted. No oil or powder are to be used on swine. Only cordless clippers will be allowed in the barn please. Only barrows

and gilts are eligible; any hog showing evidence of pigginess, scars, hernia, sores, bruises, cryptorchidism, or any blemishes that impair the value of the carcass will be disqualified. Market hogs must have been owned and cared for by the exhibitor since the fourth Saturday of January or first swine weigh-in. Market hogs must be officially tagged. The minimum weight will be 230lbs at the official weigh-in on Thursday of fair week. The maximum weight will be 300 pounds, the maximum payout weight at the livestock auction will be 290 lbs. As an example – a 297lb pig would sell at 290lbs through the livestock auction. Market hogs not meeting these weight requirements will be shown in underweight or the overweight classes. A belt buckle and rosette will be awarded to the Grand Champion and a trophy and rosette will be awarded to the Reserve Champion in Class 01. Swine exceeding 300lbs and shown in the overweight class will no longer be qualified to sell in the auction and are not eligible to compete for champion or reserve champion market swine.

4-H & FFA SMALL ANIMAL HERDSMANSHIP CONTEST: The purpose of the herdsmanship contest is to encourage exhibitors to care for livestock, pens, and equipment properly to keep stalls and animals clean and attractive at all times. Competition will be on a club or chapter basis. Judges will examine the livestock exhibits at least once daily. Their score will be totaled and averaged. The exhibits will be judged on Friday and Saturday from 9:00am – 6:00pm and Sunday from 9:00am – 2:00pm. Scores will be posted daily at a designated location in each barn. Final awards will be based on total of daily scores of each division and will be awards Sunday afternoon. In addition to each club or chapter's exhibit area, each club/chapter will be designated an area of the barn (e.g., wash rack, show arena, barn entrance, etc.) by the barn superintendent which must be kept neat and clean.

These designated areas are also judged.

- 1. Animals 35 points Arrangements, tying, cleanliness and grooming, bedding regularity of feeding and watering.
- 2. Stalls and Pens and Walkways 35 points Orderliness of equipment and supplies, neatness, and cleanliness of designated area during fair and post fair.
- 3. Educational Information 10 points Posters and stall cards are legible/complete; 4-H or FFA , Identification to be scored and judged one time only.

Exhibitors - 20 points Appearance, attitude, courtesy, skill, and Public Interaction

NOTE: ALL WORK IS TO BE DONE BY EXHIBITORS! Adult help is prohibited. Violation will result in forfeit of points.

- 1. The Grand and Reserve Champion Showmanship winner from each species (Cat, Dog, Novelty Goat, Poultry, Rabbit, Pocket Pet, & Cavy) will compete in the Small Animal Round Robin. Contestants may be from either 4-H or FFA divisions.
- 2. A contestant that has qualified in more than one species much choose only one (1) species to represent. This must be decided as soon as possible so an alternate will be found to fill the vacant spot.

- 7. Contestants will be scored on their ability to show each of the livestock species and their knowledge of those animals. They will be scored on a scale of 1-(low ability) to 10-(outstanding ability).
- 8. The contestant with the top score will be the winner. In the case of a tie, judges will conference and Immediately break the tie .

Entries will be marked down for deformities, or characteristics which are detrimental to the vigor and vitality of the exhibit for reasons that contribute to the lack of breed character and for removing parts of the birds, such as clipping wings of all breeds of chickens and turkeys and most waterfowl. The superintendent of the poultry division shall have the right to refuse any entry to remove from the fairgrounds any diseased and unsightly animals.

- If benching space is available, dogs may be kept on the grounds during the fair. The superintendent will have information concerning spaces and times allowed. If benching is allowed an exhibition tag with completed information must be on display.
- 3. Dogs must be current on all shots, including DA2PL distemper, hepatitis, and rabies. Dogs must have been

wormed. A record of this needs to be provided to the Superintendent.

- 4. Dogs must be well groomed. Coat should be glossy and combed. Animal must be free from dirt, dandruff, fleas, lice, and ticks. Ears are to be free of dirt, wax, and odor. Nails should be short, and feet should not have mats between the toes.
- 5. Handlers must be neatly groomed & appropriately dressed. For proper dress attire refer to WSU 4-H Dog Project Showmanship Guide.
- 6. In the case of a tie, there will be a runoff. A Top of Class ribbon may be awarded in each class. A special award in each age group may be awarded for the highest score in showmanship and highest score in obedience. A Best Showman Award in each age group may be given for the highest combined scores of Showmanship and Obedience. These awards are given at the judges' discretion. C: Every dog MUST be always on leash except when running on course. D: Absolutely NO collars on Open and Elite Dogs. E: Absolutely NO tags of any kind on the collar of a Novice dog. F: All exhibitors are expected to treat their dogs with kindness, no scuffing or scolding. G: Sportsmanlike conduct is expected. H: Blind dogs are not eligible to compete in agility at fair. Any other dogs that can't perform obstacles safely are also ineligible.

- 2. Asotin County 4-H Horse projects are encouraged to use the 4-H Horse project publication known as PNW 587.
- 3. To show a horse at the Asotin County Fair, 4-H member must file a horse certificate with the Asotin County Extension Office 90 days prior to the 4-H/FFA Horse Show.
- 4. A current photography of the horse must be attached to the horse certificate.
- 5. Regardless of the number of certificates filed, only two horses may be used for the 4-H/FFA Horse Show.
- 6. For the horse show, only 2 horses are allowed per youth; ONE horse may be used for all performance divisions and ONE horse may be used for all Western
- 7. Games divisions. Exhibitors may not cross divisions with either horse. Each horse must be shown in Showmanship under the division in which it is entered.
- 8. Asotin County 4-H Horse Show enforces the Pacific Northwest 4-H Horse Contest Guide rules regarding members only riding the project horse 90 days prior to showing at the Asotin County Fair. Care, control, and training should fall to the project owner exclusively during the 90-day window before fair. A request of variance to the 90-day ruling must be made in writing and presented to the Horse Leaders' Committee for approval 90 days or more prior to the fair. NO recreational use by non-project members will be permitted in that 90-day window before the fair.
- 9. To show at the Asotin County Fair, a member must have attended club meetings.
- 10. If a 4-H/FFA members' horse cannot be used due to death, severe injury or disease, the member must have a statement from a veterinarian and the 4-H members leader explaining why. The Horse Leaders Council will review the statement and approve the use of a

substitute horse. The member may show at the county level but will not qualify to exhibit at the state fair.

- 11. All riders must be dressed appropriately as stated in the PNW 4-H Horse Contest Guide.
- 12. All tack and equipment must meet the requirements stated in the PNW 4-H Horse Contest Guide.
- 13. 4-H Equestrian headgear must follow PNW 4-H Horse Contest Guide descriptions.
- 14. Equipment check will be prior to each class. This will include helmets. Equipment checks will be made by the designated person by the Horse Leaders' committee.
- 15. DRUGGING: Asotin County Horse Show enforces the PNW 4-H Horse Contest Guide rules concerning this practice.

Seniors & FFA show first; intermediates next; juniors last. The horse should do what the rider asks with the least possible effort on the part of the rider and least amount of resistance from the horse. The member will be judged on correct posture, smooth gait transitions and effective use of aids, with special emphasis on light hands. The performance of the horse is not to be considered more important than the methods used by the rider in obtaining the performance. NATIONAL SHOW RING CODE OF ETHICS:

This code of ethics applies to anyone exhibiting animals at livestock shows in the United States. It includes Juniors as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. All classes of livestock offered at the livestock event are included: Cattle (Beef and Dairy), Goats (Angora, Boer, Dairy, Meat, Cashmere), Equine (Donkey, Horses, Mules) Llamas and other specialty animals, Poultry, Rabbits, Sheep, Swine and any other livestock classes offered. This "National Show Ring Code of Ethics" will be enhanced with additional rules and regulations which individual fairs and livestock shows impose on the local, county, state regional and national levels. The following practices or procedures are unacceptable and are defined as being deceptive, fraudulent, unethical and inhumane in the care, fitting, preparation and showing of all classes of livestock. The use of any illegal drugs is prohibited. Legal or illegal substances used to phenotypically alter the appearance of an animal entered in livestock events is prohibited. (See rule #4). Use of illegal drugs is considered a premeditated act! Furthermore, any information obtained in the practice of illegal alteration of an animal will be turned over to the proper authorities for criminal prosecution. THIS IS A ONE STRIKE YOU ARE OUT POLICY! Exhibitor will forfeit any premium, awards, or auction proceeds and will be prohibited from further competition at shows in the United States as well as being subject to criminal prosecution if proven guilty. The following is a listing of guidelines all exhibitors must follow to enter livestock at organized competitive events. 1. All exhibitors must have viable proof (Junior division) of ownership available to prove length of time animals have been owned. Market animals (Beef, Sheep, Swine, Goats) must be owned and under exhibitors daily care according to established rules and regulations for the fair or livestock exposition. This also includes all small market animals (rabbit and poultry). The official ownership date is the date shown on the bill of sale, unless the animal was bred by the exhibitor, in which salving or births records must be shown. (Local rules may determine ownership requirements for nonmarket animals). Registered breeding livestock must show the exhibitor as the sole owner of the animal on the breed association paper or certificates. 2. No exhibitor may show an animal which has been previously sold at an auction or sale as a market animal through another fair, livestock show, whether or not there is an actual change of ownership (progressive level shows excluded). Any method used to misrepresent the age of an animal for a class in which it is shown is deceptive and considered illegal. Showing an animal for another individual by claiming ownership in order to show in a specific livestock class or event is prohibited. False ownership is illegal. 3. Junior exhibitions are expected to care for and groom their animals while at the fair or livestock show. (Individual consideration will be given in extenuating circumstances). Adults will not be allowed to physically assist in the preparation of the animal while at the show. Verbal instruction will be allowed, but no physical assistance is permitted. Physical assistance may be rendered by other junior aged members in good standing in the 4-H and FFA programs. Any violations of this rule will

result in immediate disqualification from the show. 4. Treating an animal internally or externally, with any irritant, counter-irritant, or other substance used to artificially change the conformation or appearance of an animal for show is considered unethical, inhumane and is prohibited. This includes, but is not limited to, the use of graphite powders, hemp, artificial hair coloring, common products such as fly spray, ointment or liniment used to the point that it is irritating (unless required to reduce edema at time of calving) or similar type products. The use of dyes, spray paint or other artificial coloring which result in altering an animal's true and natural appearance and/or color is prohibited. Adding false hair or hair-like material, fleece or skin at any point, spot, or area of the animal's body is illegal and will result in immediate disqualification. Any liquid or substance not considered, part of an accepted and normal diet for livestock is deemed illegal and inhumane. For example: the use of alcoholic or carbonated beverages as a drench or filler, etc. 5. The use of tranquilizers, sedatives, or depressants which alter the physical or physiological state of the animal is illegal. Exceptions to this rule would be a licensed, certified veterinarian's treatment for a recognized disease or injury, or recommendation for tranquilizing breeding animals in heat that might compromise the safety of others. The drugs must be approved by The Food and Drug Administration for use in meat producing animals. All exhibitors shall advise show management of any drugs and/or medication administered to an animal that might be detected at the time of showing or at meat inspection. The name of the drug, it's purpose, the person who administered the drug, time and date of administration shall be presented to show management prior to the showing and sale of the animal. Failure to report this information to the show management will result in severe penalty and/or disqualification. Any use of drugs or substances not approved by the Food and Drug Administration is strictly prohibited. All animals entered into livestock competition shall be subject to testing for foreign substances that exceed acceptable levels established by the FDA, FSIS, USDA, or EPA. During the livestock events, in the case of animals requiring treatment, all medications shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian and the livestock show officials shall be notified. 6. Surgery, injection or insertion of foreign material under the skin and/or into the flesh of an animal to change the natural contour, conformation or appearance of an animal's body is illegal. This includes vegetable oil, silicon or any other substance used to alter the shape of the animal. Acceptance practices of physical preparation which are allowed included, clipping of hair, trimming of hooves, dehorning or removal of ancillary teats. 7. The balancing of the udder by abnormal means that includes the use of a mechanical contrivance or the injection of fluid or drugs, setting the teats and/or occluding (sealing the ends) with a mechanical contrivance or with the use of a chemical preparation is illegal. Treating or massaging the udder or its attachments with an irritant or counter-irritant is prohibited. 8. The use of inhumane fitting, showing and/or handling practices or devices shall not be tolerated. For example: breaking of tails, striking of the animal to cause swelling or for bracing purposes, use of an electrical contrivance, or use of overly severe bits is not acceptable. 9. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. 10. At the time an animal is sold at auction at the livestock show, the exhibitor shall be held directly responsible for animals that are rejected at the processing center due to the presence of foreign residues. The seller may be liable to the buyer for an amount equal to three times the purchased price and may also be liable for attorney's fees and civil penalties. Show Management may share acceptable intelligence and evidence information with FDA and USDA. If for

any reason, any part of the meat animal carcass must be removed by the FDA or USDA inspectors, the market price will be discounted. 11. Show management reserved the right to require animal health certificates. Health inspections and diagnostic tests may be made before or after animals are on the livestock show premises for exhibitor and animal safety, or to inaugurate disease control procedures which may become necessary in emergencies as determined by animal health officials. Any violation of "The National Show Ring Code of Ethics" or specific rules as designated by individual fairs and livestock shows will result in forfeiture of premiums and awards, disqualification, and may result in probationary status and/or loss of eligibility for future participation in organized livestock competition. Possible civil penalties may be imposed by the proper authorities based on evidence provided by the livestock show or exhibitors in violation of the Federal Food, Drug and Cosmetic act/or the animal mistreatment, neglect, and abandonment laws that apply on the local, state, and national levels. The decision of the livestock show management will be final. Other cooperating shows, (The International Association of Fairs and Expositions, The American Livestock Show and Rodeo Managers Association, and Western Fairs Association) will be notified of the action taken by the show management, which may affect the eligibility of the individual, group, or sponsoring organization for participation at other shows who are also members of these organizations. By making entry in a livestock show or event you are verifying you have read "The National Show Ring Code of Ethics" and understand the consequences of the penalties involved for illegal, unethical, inhumane, and unfair practices of competition. You also verify that you and your family may be prohibited from future participation in organized fairs and livestock shows in the United States, and could face possible criminal prosecution and/or civil penalties if implicated in any of the aforementioned acts.
